

THE ATLANTIC.—Mr. Sparks, agent of the White Star Line, has received a certificate of the Government officers of emigration at Liverpool that there were previous emigrants of the Atlantic last 32 days. Official documents have also been received showing that the quantity of coal aboard the ship when she left Liverpool was largely in excess of the average supply for ocean steamers. Captain Williams, it is claimed, therefore only used discretionary power in turning for Halifax.
