THE SERVANT PROBLEM ENDS: SPINSTER HAS A PLAN.

Of the many schemes which have been suggested in London as a possible solution of the domestic servant problem, probably the latest is the most ambitious. The idea, which had its inception in the mind of an unmarried daughter of a country canon, and which has been largely discussed in the London press, is that of the formation of a co-operative government between mistresses and maids. The scheme is called "The National Registry, Limited." It is planned to obtain an army of 100,000 and 200,000 servants to bind themselves together in a friendly union. The work is to be done systematically. A town or district will be taken and a few ladies there induced to interest themselves in the movement. "Then," says a cynic, "the trouble will begin, for the whole place is to be canvassed in order to get into touch with those who will have them to offer. The response no doubt will be prodigious, and the tales told each side will be edifying when they are not scandalous." But it is to come out all right in the end, for when two hundred ladies are prepared to pay \$5 each, a local committee of management will be formed and the good mistress and the servant will embrace each other. Of course only exemplary servants and mistresses with good characters will be admitted into this noble society, which pronounces the doom of the bogus and undesirable registry office and is to save \$5,000,000 a year alleged to be paid in fees by mistresses and servants to the registry office.

While working in his yard on East Main street, Hamilton, a few days ago, Thomas Deake, ex-manager of the Canadian Cannery Company, was seized with heart failure, and died before medical aid could be summoned. He was 53 years of age and leaves a widow.

Alex. Belanger, a rag picker, was shot in a Dominion street restaurant, Montreal, Wednesday afternoon, by Leon Locallion, the proprietor. A quarrel over lunch served to the rag picker led to the shooting. Belanger was hit in the region of the heart, and may not recover. Locallion was arrested.

The most important action taken at the session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge of Oddfellows was the choice of a meeting place for its next annual session. After a spirited contest the honor went to Washington, D. C., which received 98 votes against 20 for Buffalo, 18 for Philadelphia, 14 for Cleveland, and 11 for Montreal.

WIFE MURDERER TO HANG.

Magloire Hogue, for the murder of his wife, was sentenced at Montreal a few days ago to hang on November 18. Hogue's wife was found with her throat cut. The husband, in a drunken brawl, had killed the woman because she refused to give him money for liquor. Hogue broke down when the death sentence was passed.

CONGRESS MOVES FOR INTERVENTION IN WAR.

Le Comte Goblet D'Alviella presented the following resolution calling for intervention in the Russo-Japanese war to the Inter-Parliamentary Congress, which held its session in St. Louis a few days ago: "The Inter-Parliamentary Congress, shocked by the horrors of the war that is being waged in the Far East, between two civilized states, and deploring that the powers signatory of the convention of The Hague have been unable to have recourse to the clauses thereof which direct them to tender their mediation immediately upon the outbreak of hostilities, asks the powers signatory of the convention of The Hague to intervene either jointly or severally with the belligerents in order to facilitate the restoration of peace, or instruct the Inter-Parliamentary Bureau to bring the present resolution of the said powers." Le Comte D'Alviella urged that the President of the United States was quite the proper person to tender mediation. After the alarmist reports in circulation were next taken up, Congressman Burton of Cleveland presented the resolution and urged its adoption. The resolution was supported enthusiastically and its adoption was unanimously voted. By this resolution President Roosevelt is asked to call a second session of The Hague Conference. The real labors of the conference were thus ended.

LORD STRATHCONA DONATES \$50,000 TO MCGILL.

At the opening of the medical course at McGill College the other day, Dean Roddick gave out the welcome news that Lord Strathcona had donated \$50,000 more to the general needs of the medical faculty.

G. T. P. PARTY AT MONTREAL.

President Hays and the party of directors returned to Montreal a few days ago. Mr. Hays was delighted with what he had seen in the west, and was more firmly convinced than ever of the great possibilities before the Grand Trunk Pacific railway project. He had nothing definite to announce re the Pacific terminal.

FINAL SETTLEMENT OF CONTRABAND QUESTION.

Russia's position on the question of contraband will be officially promulgated in the form of decisions of the Admiralty Court in the cases of the Calchas, Arabia and Allan-town, when they come up on appeal, says a St. Petersburg cable. Prof. de Maartens, president of the commission which decided the Russian interpretation of the contraband, will appear on behalf of the Government, thus insuring the acceptance of the principles formulated by the commission. He will be in possession of the British and American notes, and the contentions of those Governments will be practically before the courts. Russia's position has been authoritatively stated as follows: Russia does not desire to interfere with Great Britain's legitimate commerce with Japan, but she has the right to, and must, protect herself as far as possible against shipments which may aid the enemy in prosecuting the war.

Oliver Dufresne, city comptroller, Montreal, dropped dead at his residence Wednesday morning. Heart disease was the cause.

Fire destroyed five-story buildings inside the state prison walls at Michigan City, Ind., causing a loss of \$100,000. The authorities deny that convicts started the blaze.
