A year ago the same class of goods brought 8½c to 9c, or 1½c to 1½c less. Nearly all the western April make has been bought up from the factorymen, and in quite a number of instances we understand the make has been contracted up to May 8, such a thing as was never before known in the history of the trade. It looks as if the English market was prepared to take our moderate volume of new make at about present prices. 
