—Messrs. Hunter and Crossley, the well-known evangelists, were in the city yesterday, on their return from the Methodist conference at St. Marys.

—The hospital building committee met last night and decided to pay Architect McBride \$476.07 in full of account and to dispense with his services.

—Mr. James Ward is rapidly recovering from the injuries he received at the recent fire, and is expected to be around again in a couple of days. His little daughter is now out of danger, and Miss McFie, the domestic, who had her ankle broken, is doing nicely.

—The final meeting of the Pretoria demonstration committee was held last night. The accounts received showed a balance of \$7.27 remaining from the \$20 granted by the city and county councils and the school board. The three pipers who participated in the parade, were granted \$2 each.

—Some 42 dogs have been captured by the "man with the net" this season, none of them wearing the necessary tag. Many of the animals were redeemed from the pound by their owners, and the rest were disposed of. The catchers report a scarcity of dogs in the city, and state that they are of a better class than a few years ago, when the present system was first inaugurated.

—At a well-attended meeting of the London Old Boys' Association committee, which met last night in the city hall, it was decided to hold a ball and concert in Victoria Park next Wednesday evening. Many other features have also been arranged for. The proceeds will be devoted to the entertainment of the Old Boys. It is probable that an association from Toledo will be here on Aug. 5.

—The funeral of the late S. A. MacVicar took place from the family residence, Sarnia, on Monday afternoon. The remains were laid at rest in Lakeview Cemetery. Rev. Mr. Hall, pastor of the Albert Street Presbyterian Church, conducted the services. The four sons of deceased, William, Alfred, Charles and Julius, and two nephews, sons of Col. MORE WAR RELICS.

John J. Cox this morning received by mail another package of curios collected in South Africa by Fred Evans, a member of the first Canadian contingent. The relics were packed in a tin box, with "Huyler, New York," embossed on the lid, the box being inclosed in a double wrapping of khaki, and bound with strips of cotton. The box contained half a dozen ostrich feathers, one flathead bullet and six Mauser bullet cartridges, one pair khaki-colored socks, one silk and three linen handkerchiefs, one brass bracelet and two brass regimental emblems.

PERMANENT RED CROSS SOCIETY

A permanent Red Cross Society of the Canadian branch, in affiliation with the British society, was formed at a meeting held in the city hall last night. After agreeing to the constitution, the following officers were elected: President, Mayor Rumball; secretary, Mrs. Barker; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Yarker; treasurer, Miss Shaw-Wood. The invitation of the Local Council of Women to affiliate with that body was accepted. The advisory committee was re-elected, with power to add. Mrs. Leach reported relative to the work already done.

A BOER BIBLE.

Grafton & Co. have on exhibition in their window a Boer Bible, which was purchased by a member of the first Canadian contingent and presented to Grafton & Co. The Bible bears the inscription: "Elizabeth Hattingh, born Kap. April 14, 1893. A present from C. P. Hattingh." On a blank leaf at the back of the Bible is written: "Mrs. Christian Hattingh lives [leaves] this Bible to Chrissie Hattingh, her only child." On another blank leaf is scribbled "Elizabeth—Cousin of shed." While several texts are written in Dutch on the inside back cover. The Bible is one issued by the British and Foreign Bible Society, and is printed entirely in Dutch, but the lettering on the maps inserted is in English.
