The general outlook seems to be for rather more settled weather, and winds are unlikely to be more than moderate either on the lakes or on the Atlantic coast. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 50-64; Kamloops, 50-82; Calgary, 42-74; Prince Albert, 56-74; Qu'Appelle, 74-76; Winnipeg, 52-70; Port Arthur, 50-63; Parry Sound, 48-66; Toronto, 62-74; Ottawa, 58-76; Montreal, 60-72; Quebec, 58-72; Halifax, 58-74.

Local temperature: The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Tuesday, July 10, were: Highest, 75.5; lowest, 44.8.

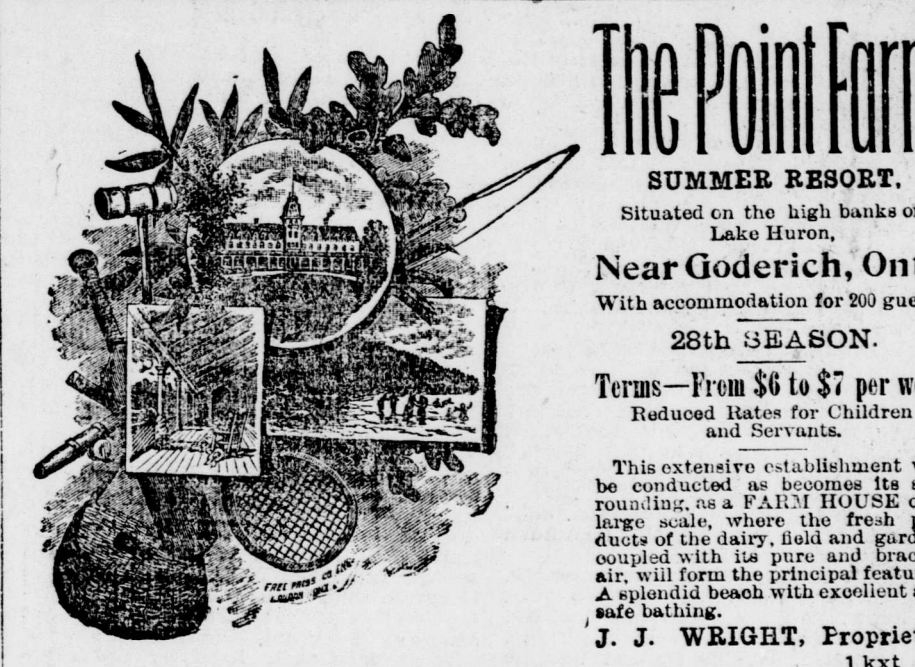

The Montreal medical health officer has another suspected case of smallpox under surveillance.

The County of Peel Agricultural Society has decided to rebuild the hall at Brampton recently destroyed by fire.

Richard Powell, a laborer, dropped dead on the street at Ottawa Saturday afternoon on account of extreme heat.
