"Drop yourself a postal card?" echoed his companion in surprise; "what the deuce do you mean?" "Exactly what I say," replied the other, extracting a card from his pocket and scribbling a few words by the light of a drug store window. "It's the best and cheapest, and most effective memory jogger in the world. You see, I am rather absent-minded," he went on, "and I have tried all the stereotyped schemes without much success."
