BOARD WANTS MORE MONEY.

City's Schools Require \$111,630 for the Present Year.

School Board's Estimates Are \$4,000 in Excess of 1901—Increase in Salary Item.

The board of education met last night to receive the estimates from the audit committee. The figures were accepted as presented. The sum required by the board for the year is \$111,630, or \$4,000 more than that required last year.

The estimated receipts from the Collegiate Institute were \$6,470 and the disbursements \$28,235, which, with sinking fund and interests, leaves \$22,144 25 to be provided.

Public schools—Receipts, \$7,900; disbursements, \$92,265 76; estimated expenditure with sinking fund, interest and Westminster township school disbursements, of \$84,455 77.

The increase of \$4,000 over the estimates of last year, consists of an overdraft from 1901 and increased salaries. Last year's total estimate was \$107,630.

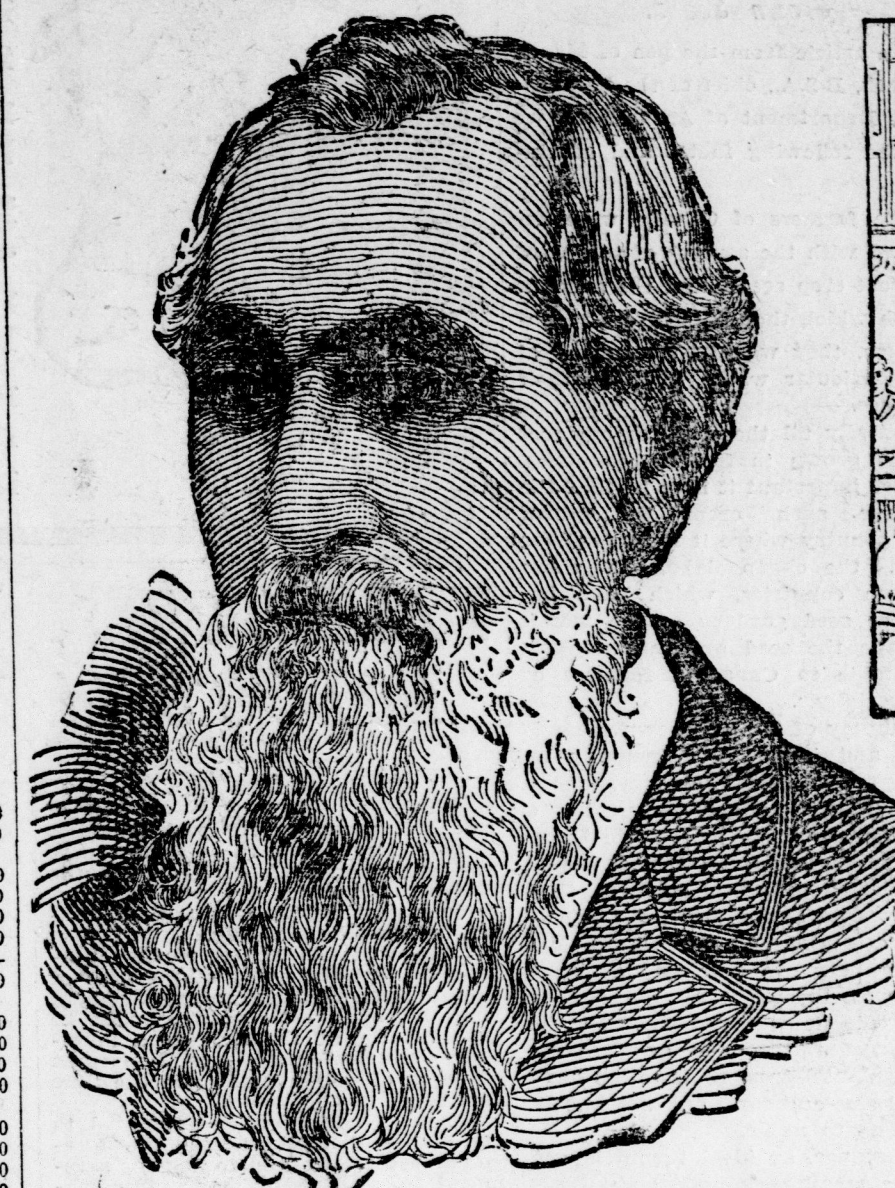
