City's Schools Require \$111,630 for the Present Year.

School Board's Estimates Are \$4,000 in Excess of 1901—Increase in Salary Item.

The board of education met last night to receive the estimates from the audit committee. The figures were accepted as presented. The sum required by the board for the year is \$111,-630 02, or \$4,000 more than that required last year.

The estimated receipts from the Collegiate Institute were \$6,470 and the disbursements \$26,285, which, with sinking fund and interests, leaves \$22,-144 25 to be provided.


