will be held this afternoon in Toronto,

ada. The officers learned that the young
couple were eloping from their homes in
Hamilton, Ont., and that they were en-
route for Detroit, where they were to
have been married. The father of the
girl arrived in Port Huron a few hours
after the couple reached the city, but
the girl refused to accompany him home,
stating that she was going to marry
Smith or leave home. The father asked
the immigration officials to deport them,
and after their arrival in Canada, the
father gave his consent to the marriage,
and they were made happy within an
hour after.
