THIRTY-TWO DEAD SCORES MISSING

Latest Estimates of Death Toll at Austin, Pa.

CLEANING UP THE DEBRIS

Philadelphia Sends Money, Food and Clothing to the Distressed.

[Canadian Press.] Austin, Pa., Oct. 3.—Relief work of the night and early morning revealed the new horrors, and Austin today believes that it knows the worst of the calamity that overhung it Saturday afternoon when the waters of the broken Bayless dam swept the valley. The list of known dead stood this morning at 32, while the heavy town census showed that 54 still were missing. Effective organized relief is well under way, and help is this morning offered by many places in the state.

Commissioner S. G. Dixon, of the state health department, has notified all proprietors that clothing and food supplies were in demand. Philadelphia sent word that \$5,000 had been raised, and was on the way. Dubois, Pa., has sent volunteers and 200 laborers to help in the work.

Three men came in bank cars, had raised \$2,000 in a few hours, and had dispatched supplies by automobile. The cash is needed largely in transporting the articles to friends and relatives in other parts of the country. More laborers on the state pay rolls have been ordered in this morning. They will come in bank cars with three days' rations to preclude their being a drag on the relief supplies and resources.

Great throngs have been made into the mass of tangled debris. A steam roller at work all yesterday along the tracks of the Buffalo and Susquehanna Railroad, whose tracks lay through the middle of the wreckage, picked up and tossed aside whole buildings, clearing great spaces in a few minutes. Beneath one of these buildings three bodies were found. They were those of a mother, an infant and a child about five years old.

The citizens are able to care for any in distress. Several warehouses of needful supplies and all money needed. Some clothing for women and children will be needed within a week. A canvass is being made to ascertain their needs.

NO STRIKE TROUBLE AT I. C. R. SHOPS

Company Claim That Eight Hundred Are Still at Work.

Chicago, Oct. 3.—Peace and quiet reigned at the Burnside shops of the Illinois Central Railroad Company during the early hours today. The eight hundred men who are still employed at the plant were not annoyed as they entered the shops. Groups of strikers stood outside, but they made no attempt to interfere with the men who remained at work.

Illinois Central officials declared that the company could fill the vacancies caused by the walk-out in an hour, but that there was no need of maintaining such a large force at present. They say that the company's business has not been interfered with in any way by the strike. Representatives of the labor union deny the truth of the company's assertions and insist that there are not more than two hundred men at work at Burnside, and that the entire repair department will be crippled and the entire service impaired in a few days, unless the strike is settled and the men return to their places.

POLICE DOING A GOOD WORK

Determined to Stop Cruelty to Horses in This City.

TWO CASES ADJOURNED

One Man is Charged With Racing and Beating His Horse, and Also With Damaging Property.

Arthur Collins appeared in the police court this morning to answer a charge of cruelty to animals and malicious damage to property. Monday evening P. C. Houlden noticed Collins, together with another young fellow, in a rig, racing with two other fellows in another rig. Collins, it is alleged, was beating the horse cruelly.

The race led to Maple street, where the horse and rig Collins was driving came in contact with Mr. Ed. Hunter's taxicab, which was standing outside the garage. The front lamps on the taxicab were smashed, and one of the fenders bent, while the rig Collins was driving was smashed badly. The horse was uninjured, however.

Admitted Damage. This morning, Collins, through his lawyer, Mr. T. F. Foulds, pleaded guilty to the charge of damaging the automobile, and wanted to pay for the damage done, but he claimed he was not guilty of beating the horse. The case was accordingly adjourned until Tuesday morning, when the crown attorney will be ready to go on with it. The damage to the taxicab amounts to about \$5.

Henry Patrick was summoned for cruelty to animals in driving a horse that had a large sore on its shoulder. Patrick was warned by P. C. Houlden that the horse was unfit for driving, but his employer ordered him to do so. The case was adjourned until Saturday, when his employer will be brought before the court.

Drunks in Court. George Shell, who gave his address as 450 Dundas street, was brought before the court on a charge of drunkenness. He was drunk Monday evening, but when two officers went on the stand and swore that Shell was decidedly drunk, the prisoner changed his mind, and thought that he might have been a little bit worse off than he was. He was let go on condition that he leave the city that night.

R. McCreedy, of Strathroy, came to town Monday night with a drunken wife. This morning he did not seem to appreciate the fact that the prisoner had discharged him, and the P. M. was led to believe that McCreedy had not sobered up yet. He was held over until the afternoon, when it is expected he will be in a more appreciative mood.

James Watson, a second-time, was remanded for a week.

Mrs. Little, whose alcoholic temperament has given the police a great deal of trouble, was remanded to the hospital for a week until it is decided whether she is best to be done with her. The woman is in a dejected condition.

an expend money without stint and one body raised the money, the city council, in my judgment, these six ladies should be brought together under one commission, so that the body that raises the money should spend it.

Now a word as to salary. It is not my intention to make the salary sufficiently large to pay a man to go into civic life. It is rather intended to pay the expenses while he is engaged in civic life.

Primary Elections. "I would like to see the elections carried out to the full expression of public opinion. Every citizen should be secured. There are two ways of doing this in the United States. One is by the system of primary election. This is a preliminary election, held some time before the general election, and a gratification to the electors, where hun-

number of candidates are voted on. If four candidates are to be elected, the eight highest go to the ballot and four are selected. In this way the cliques are avoided, and the best men secured. The other way is different, but the general results are the same. A number of candidates are balloted on, and the voter must express his choice whether first, second, third or fourth, and so down the list. The general results are summed up, and the most suitable candidates are chosen. In this way the influence of the cliques are avoided.

Only a Plebiscite. "Of course, this is but a plebiscite. There is no law whereby we can have a commission, but if the citizens pronounce definitely upon the question, we can go to the Legislature with a request for this form of government. I have been informed that such a request would be favorably considered by the Government. They might not agree to include the various bodies under one government, as I have outlined, but some good will come out of it. I think the people should have some idea as to what is under discussion, and they should be given an opportunity of expressing their views."

MEN INFORMED OF THE HAMILTON OUTING

Seventh Regiment Had Route March and Drill On Monday Night.

A route march of the Seventh Regiment was held Monday evening. The regiment, headed by the band and bugle band, marched down Dundas street from the Armouries, and a short drill was held on the market square, after which the soldiers returned to their quarters.

The officers were well pleased with the turnout and the work of the men, and they are confident that in a week or so the men will be turning out 360 strong.

The announcement of the trip to Hamilton on Thanksgiving Day was made, and already preparations are being made for the event. It is the first time in the history of the Seventh Regiment that they have taken part in tactical events, and a good showing will be made. Regiments from Toronto, Hamilton, and other cities and towns in Ontario will be taking part in the tactics, and it is expected that fully ten thousand soldiers will be in Hamilton on that date.

The Seventh and Twenty-sixth Regiments will represent this division. Last evening about 25 recruits applied at the Armouries, and before the end of the week it is expected that three times that number will make application.

PREFERS HANGING TO JAIL SENTENCE

Plea Causes Judge To Give Him Second Chance.

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 3.—Threatened with a jail sentence, James Burgess, an Englishman, and a student at the Northwestern University, begged Judge Newcomer in court yesterday that he be hanged instead.

Burgess had been arrested for taking an automobile from the garage of his employer. With companions—two of them women—and a negro chauffeur, Burgess made a boulevard tour. He and the negro were arrested as they were driving the car back into the garage. Judge Newcomer gave them a 30-day sentence.

"I'd rather be sentenced to hanging," exclaimed Burgess. "A jail sentence would disgrace me when my schoolmaster, my friends, and my own father and mother." It would ruin my life forever.

"Well," Judge Newcomer said, "I'll think it over. See if you can get a little money to pay a fine."
