S OME years ago a new type of telephone transmitter was brought out by the Bell Company, Until that time the people of London had the old-Istyle Blake transmitter. Evidently the company replaced the Blake instrunent in order to perfect its service, and to bring about more economical management. But, on the strength of this "modern" improvement, for some years it has been collecting an extra annual sum of \$5 from each subscriber for the new transmitter. If a subscriber cared to keep the old instrument he did not have to pay the extra charge, but if a new transmitter were placed in his home he paid the extra charge, and although the cost of the new equipment on good authority is said to be less than the annual charge, the subscriber is taxed with the extra \$5 each year. He scores a strong point when he says that Germany can illafford to complain of the treatment of prisoners. Sir Edward points out that since the war began the British have rescued over 1,000 German sailors, while the Germans have not rescued a single British sailor. 
