QUOTED VALUES IN NEW YORK LOWER

Only Few Specialties Protected by Bull Pools Escape Depreciation.

NEW YORK, May 20.—Depreciation of quoted values in the stock market made further substantial progress today. Reactions encompassed a majority of the popular issues, the only exceptions being a few specialties protected by bull pools.

The same discouraging factors which served as restraining influences in the preceding days of the week were operative again. Chief among these were the continued tightness of money rates, and additional dividend suspensions. In the latter class were included Chesapeake and Ohio, and American Linseed, common.

The first named incident seemed to occasion much surprise, the stock declining 6 points on heavy offerings of the Chesapeake and Ohio dividend.

Exchange on London, Paris and other important centers eased slightly from recent high levels. The various railroads suffered a setback, with Chesapeake and Ohio's S and A tractions also losing ground.

Liberty issues closed at nominal gains, but most of the foreign war floatations showed further irregularity. The total sales of bonds, par value, aggregated \$10,400,000.

TORONTO EXCHANGE TRADING FALLS OFF

Riordon Old Common Reaches New Low—Burt Stocks Advance.

TORONTO, May 20.—Although the volume of trading fell off considerably on the Toronto Stock Exchange today, there was a slightly better tone to the market. Another heavy cut in Riordon carried the old common stock to a new low level of 1 1/4. Even with the slight rally at the close there was a decline of 2 1/4 points.

A much more cheerful development of the day was an announcement of a 10 per cent cash bonus, together with the regular dividend on F. N. Burt, common, and on hearing of this, the stock sold up to 1 1/4 in the afternoon, a rise of 5 1/4 points. The announcement had a tonic effect on the market, and caused a good deal of favorable comment.

Weakness in Riordon, old common, extended to the other Riordon stocks, with the new common losing a fraction of a point, and the preferred losing 3 points to 17 1/4. Other papers, however, were irregular. Abitibi was slightly stronger; Spanish River, common was 1 point off, and the preferred 1 point higher.

Trading in the Burt stocks took place in the afternoon, and, besides the advance in the common, the preferred went up 2 points to 110. The movement in preferred, upon which there is no increase in dividend, was, of course, explained by the fact that it is convertible into common, hence the two stocks generally move close together, and their course over a year is like that of a pair of twins.

There was again active trading in Bell Telephone rights, but they sold down to 100 here, closing at 100, a loss of 50. Telephone stock, lost another fraction, and is now only 102 1/2. Tractions moved slightly either way, fractional and Winnipeg Railway gaining fractionally, and Toronto and Quebec Railway being slightly down. Macdonald and Canadian Steamships easier.

There was trading in fractions of British Empire Steel issues in the unlisted section, and at a meeting after the close of the exchange the securities of the company were listed, to be called on Monday, on the same day as at Montreal.

EGGS AND BUTTER TAKE ANOTHER DROP ON LOCAL MARKET

Large Supplies of Vegetables Offered At Biggest Market of Year.

The attendance at the local market on Saturday was the largest this year. There were heavy offerings of vegetables and dairy products, and a fairly good demand was experienced. Butter was plentiful, and crack quotations, wholesale, were 27c and 30c per lb; the retail prices remain at 30c and 32c; the dairy grade sells at the same quotation.

The retail price of eggs fell 2c per dozen, and prices are between 28c and 30c. The minimum wholesale price was marked at 25c per dozen. The demand was not what could be called active.

Asparagus sold for 12 1/2c per dozen; green onions at 30c per dozen, and rhubarb at 40c per dozen. The quality of all offerings of these vegetables was good. It was intimated that asparagus was not very good, because of the dry weather.

'PEG' WHEAT PRICES STRONG AND HIGHER

Result Largely of Bullish Crop Conditions West and Southwest.

CHICAGO, May 20.—Soaring prices today for wheat resulted largely from bullish crop conditions both West and Southwest. The market closed strong at 3 1/4c to 3 1/2c higher, with May, \$1.59 1/4 to \$1.59 3/4, and July, \$1.53 1/2 to \$1.54. Corn finished unchanged to 3/4c lower; oats gained 1/4c to 3/4c, and provisions lost 2 1/2c to 5c.

From the outside, the bulls had the advantage in the wheat market. It appeared to be generally admitted that the winter crop has suffered material injury, the Southwest in particular losing ground, notably Oklahoma, Texas and Missouri. Reports were also current that unless plentiful moisture came soon in Kansas heavy losses would occur in sections which at present look promising. Bull made much of the fact that Russia had been buying wheat at Liverpool, and was in the market for more. It was stated that continued export demand for United States wheat would remain an important factor. With such an outlook the market developed strength up to the close, closing at practically the topmost level of the day.

Predictions that corn receipts here would show a decided increase next week tended to weaken the corn market. On the other hand, reports indicated that the condition of oats is below the average for this time of the year.

In the provisions market the effect of higher quotations on hogs was counterbalanced by the weakness of corn. The market closed steady.

'PEG' WHEAT MARKET IS MUCH STRONGER Spread Again Widens Between May and July—Latter Subordinate.

WINNIPEG, May 20.—The local wheat market was very strong today, and during the season May gained over 8c. The spread again widened between May and July, the latter position not being relatively as strong. There was a broad active trade. The demand appeared large, while the offerings in both cash and futures were quite liberal.

As compared with previous days, the May futures were quite liberal, and was reported that 750,000 bushels of Manitoba wheat had been worked to Great Britain for immediate shipment.

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WIDE VARIATIONS IN MONTREAL TRADE
