REBELS MARCH UPON DROGHEDA

Fail in Attempt To Enter City by Means of Rail-road.

Nationals Hold Town Hall Against Advance of Republican Forces.

DROGHEDA, Ireland, Aug. 14.—The irregular troops who seized Dundalk have advanced south to within four miles of Drogheda. The Nationals here are actively engaged in placing the town in a state of defense.

Dundalk was only lightly held by the Nationals. Among the killed in the fighting was Capt. Frank Byrne, a well-known Free Stater, and chairman of the rural council. Details of the casualties are still lacking, but they were rather heavy. Twenty persons are known to have been wounded. Some reports say forty.

All railway, telegraphic and telephonic communication between Dundalk and Drogheda is interrupted.

In Dundalk, Queen's Hotel was destroyed and the Anne Street Barracks blown up. The irregulars captured the workshops of the Great Northern Railway. At Killystown the irregulars left the train to march on Drogheda. Reinforcements are being sent to the aid of the nationalists.

SURPRISE NATIONALS.

Belfast, Aug. 14.—A large force of Republicans entered Dundalk at three o'clock this morning taking the National garrison completely by surprise. The attack was successful and the town is now isolated, with Republican troops patrolling the streets. The Republicans seized a railway engine, which was dispatched south with a view to blocking the rear and preventing the free states from sending reinforcements.

The Anne street police headquarters, which was occupied by the Nationals, was the first objective to be stormed and taken. The garrison was captured.

U. S. Strike Briefs

CLEVELAND, Aug. 14.—W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, today instructed two vice-presidents of his organization to go immediately on the Santa Fe coast lines where illegal strikes of trainmen are reported in effect and trains marooned.

"Instructions were given the vice-presidents," Mr. Lee said, "to insist that all laws of the brotherhood regarding cessation of work be complied with."

CHANNING, Mich., Aug. 14.—Twenty-five strike-breakers brought here by the St. Paul and Northwestern Railroad to work in the roundhouse, were 15 men are on strike, were taken out of town last night after strikers, ambushed in a swamp near the roundhouse, had fired more than 200 shots from high-powered rifles into their lodging quarters.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 14.—A Santa Fe relief train carrying approximately 125 passengers, many of whom still were suffering the effects of the terrific heat of the desert, arrived here from Needles last night after four days' delay when train service men refused to proceed. Santa Fe officials manned the relief train.

BRACKEN WILL SPEAK AT IRISH SOCIETY BANQUET

R. L. Bracken, M.L.A. for West Kent, accepted last night an invitation to speak at the banquet of the Irish Benevolent Society, which will be held at Port Stanley following the picnic on Thursday next.

It is expected that a member of the federal cabinet will also speak. Premier King, owing to a pressure of business, was unable to accept.

3 INJURED WHEN CAR AT FLESHERTON OVERTURNS

TORONTO, Aug. 14.—Word has arrived in the city of serious injuries received yesterday by a local motorist party, when their car overturned on the road just south of the village of Flesherton. Its occupants were Mr. and Mrs. W. Keenan, Jr., of Toronto, and Mrs. Bowerman of Regina.

Their injuries consist for the most part of cuts and bruises, except in the case of Mrs. Keenan, who is in a critical condition as a result of a fractured shoulder and broken ribs.

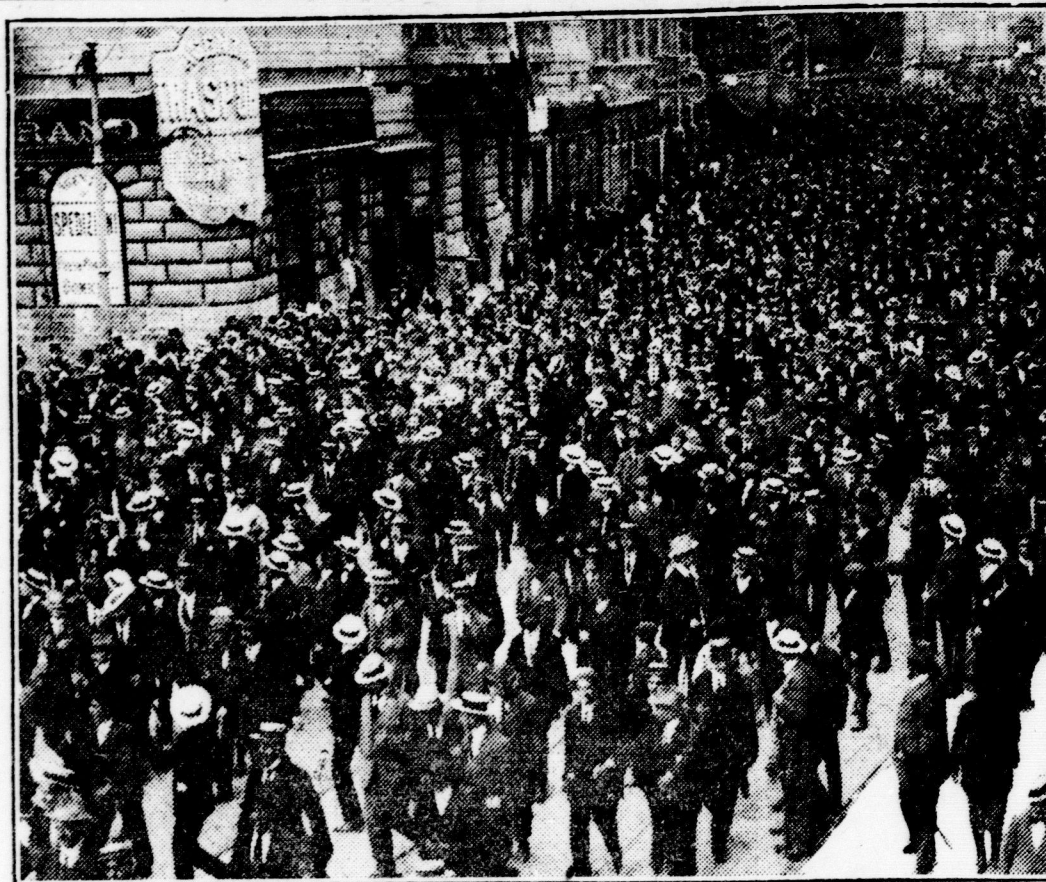

Swallows Open Pin Second Time To Escape Prison Through Death

MONTREAL, Aug. 14.—Safety pins as the path to mortal extinction have twice been resorted to by Adrian Payeur, 24 years of age, a prisoner in Bordeaux Jail, who is awaiting trial on a charge of theft.

Two years ago, while held on a previous charge, he swallowed a safety pin in an effort to end his life. Quick work on the part of surgeons saved him.

Yesterday guards found him in distress in his cell, the result of having repeated his attempt to dispose of himself by partaking of an opened safety pin.

The pin has not yet been found, but the prison surgeon does not think Payeur is in a serious condition.

DEMAND RIGHT TO SELL STRONG BEER

Hotelmen Claim Public Support in Asking For New Concession.

TORONTO, Aug. 14.—That hotelmen in the smaller Ontario towns are almost unanimous in their demand for light beer privileges, and that the public demand for this concession is even more insistent is the statement of MacLennan, Liberal member of the Legislature for Cochrane, although now an independent, and representing the cross-benches on the hotel and tourist select committee of the house.

Mr. MacLennan states that from his observation of the situation as a member of the committee he is sure that a majority of the people in these places are desirous of having a per cent beer restored in the province to be sold at meals and at tables during restricted hours.

"It is only fair, too, that if they want a referendum on this they should have it," said he.

The committee goes to Hamilton, St. Catharines, Welland, Niagara Falls, etc., this week, spending the entire week in the Niagara Peninsula.

VISCONTRESS RHONDDA ARRIVES IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—Viscountess Rhondda, known as Great Britain's loveliest woman, was an unannounced visitor in New York today, having arrived yesterday on the Adriatic, practically incognito.

She refused to discuss her flight to obtain a seat in England's House of Lords, except to say that she would renew the battle when she returns, although her application has been definitely set aside by the committee on privileges.

DISCUSS EGG-MARKETING AT POULTRY CONFERENCE

OTTAWA, Aug. 14.—Representatives of the various poultry and egg interests of the Dominion, including producers, railroads and consumers had a conference with deputy minister of agriculture, when the problem of marketing of eggs and other kindred subjects were discussed.

Plans for the grading of eggs were advanced, and the importation question also received consideration. A number of important recommendations are expected to be drawn up at the conference, which continued this afternoon.

TERRIFIC STORM SWEEPS OVER TOWN IN MANITOBA

GLADSTONE, Man., Aug. 14.—A storm of cyclonic proportions struck this town and vicinity Sunday night. Buildings in the town were unroofed, shade trees uprooted, and crops for a mile in width and some eight or ten miles long, were ruined by flying hail.

The telephone system was put out of commission and only a few telegrams were available today. No lives were lost in Gladstone, but property damage will be heavy.

REPORTS HEALTH GOOD IN BRANTFORD TOWNSHIP

George Unger, the medical health officer, and Secretary D. H. Tattersall were appointed a committee to locate a dumping ground for the use of the residents of Grand View.

MOURN PASSING OF NORTHCLIFFE

French Press Claims British Publisher Was True Friend of Republic.

German Papers Blame Late Viscount For Bringing U. S. Into War.

PARIS, Aug. 14.—Viscount Northcliffe was mourned today by the French press as one of the country's best and most powerful friends. The comment of the afternoon newspapers, who received the news late, can be summed up in the words in the Petit Parisien, appearing tomorrow:

"France saw in him a singularly ardent friend, true and faithful, who never failed her during twenty years. France cannot forget him."

GERMANS CONDEMN.

BERLIN, Aug. 14.—The German newspapers, commenting on the death of Viscount Northcliffe, are outspoken in their condemnation of the man, as the Allgemeine Zeitung designates him, "who organized the campaign of German-baiting throughout the world." This paper charges that he systematically built up a world coalition against Germany.

"The blood of millions clings to his hands," says the Pan-American Tages Zeitung, which believed that Lord Northcliffe spent billions on propaganda which eventually accomplished the entry of the United States into the world war.

Viscount Northcliffe's genius as an organizer is amply recognized in the German editorial opinions, although some of the Berlin papers express the belief that his influence on the press of England proved demoralizing. It is recalled that he planned to issue a daily paper in Berlin in English, and that he secured the German government's permission for this enterprise in the spring of 1914.

DAMAGED PROPELLER WILL DELAY STEAMER

LONDON, Aug. 14.—The Cunard Line offices have received a wireless message from the steamer Benicaria, due at Cherbourg tomorrow at noon, from New York, that she will be delayed, her propeller having been damaged, presumably by striking submerged wreckage.

The August 18 sailing for New York may be delayed a few days, as the vessel will have to be placed in drydock for repairs.

DISCOVER REGISTERED MAIL TAMPERED WITH

LONDON, Aug. 14.—(Canadian Press Cable.)—When postal officials arrived to unload the mail train at Euston Station today, they found that four or five bags of registered mail from Canada had been tampered with.

What happened exactly is not yet known, but an investigation is proceeding.

Four Young People Meet Death in River Near Saskatoon.

SASKATOON, Sask., Aug. 14.—Four young people, two boys and two girls, were drowned in the North Saskatchewan River, near Hephburn, on Sunday afternoon. Their names are: Benny Peters, Stella Peters, Herman Roetz and Olga Kruger. Miss Kruger was brought to shore, but was too far gone to survive. The bodies of the other three have not yet been recovered.

CEASE HUNGER STRIKE AT SIGHT OF MILK AND EGGS

Communist Prisoners at Paris, After Brief Hesitation, Eat Food With Evident Enjoyment.

PARIS, Aug. 14.—(Canadian Press Cable.)—Milk and eggs set tantalizing in front of them caused communist prisoners here to abandon their hunger strike. The prisoners and their friends had been giving the authorities considerable trouble of late, and only the other day a party of friends had to be forcibly ejected from the prison.

The hunger strikers were informed yesterday that they would be fed forcibly if they persisted with the strike. Today they were taken to the prison hospital, where forcible feeding appliances were erected, and at the same time milk and eggs produced. After brief hesitation the strikers surrendered and began to eat with evident enjoyment. They announced that the strike was over.
