These will be for a maturity date of 20 years, that is, 1934, but there is a special provision, such as sponsible was inserted in the bonds sold to the statement miversities, by which, at the option of the province, they may be called in at the end of fifteen years. in at the end of fifteen years. Another provision is that the bonds are free of succession duties. This clause, by the way, is now compulsory on the province, according to existing statutes. The last issue of Quebec Province was in December, 1921, when an issue was made of \$4,000,000, 5½ per cent, maturing in 15 years. Of this, \$6,000,000 was taken by the three universities, \$3,000,000 comprising a gift from the province.


