RECORDS UPHELD IN BUTTER TEST

Oxford County Holsteins in
Dominion R. O. M.
Contests.

Woodstock, June 25.—Oxford county
Holsteins upheld their reputation in
the Dominion R. O. M. tests for the
month of May.

In the senior three-year-old test,
Ourville Aaglie Banostine won first
place with 28.01 pounds of butter
churned. Second place in the same
class was awarded to Dixie Abbeir
Pontiac, owned by E. A. Hubert of
Norwich, with 23.93 pounds of butter
churned in one week and 95.15 pounds
during the whole month.

In the junior three-year-old class,
two cows from Malcolm Schell's herd,
Riverside Paladin Ormsley, with 31.06
pounds of butter, and Riverside Dor-
othy Johanna, with 23.41 pounds of
butter in seven days.

Two of Mr. Schell's cows lead in the
senior two-year-old tests. Ruby
Mercedes captured second place
with 24.39 pounds of butter, and
Butter Queen Karndyke came third
with 22.93 pounds.

First place in the junior two-year-
old class was taken by Baroness Ox-
ford Champion, owned by A. E. Lieber-
of Tavistock with a record of
23.59 pounds.

COURT DISMISSES ASSAULT CHARGE

Charles Awrey, Chatham, Was
Alleged To Have Struck
Neighbor.

Chatham, June 25.—Charles Awrey,
Lake shore road, Raleigh, was dis-
missed in county police court today
on a charge of assaulting his neigh-

GREAT BRITAIN TO RATIFY 8-HOUR DAY CONVENTION

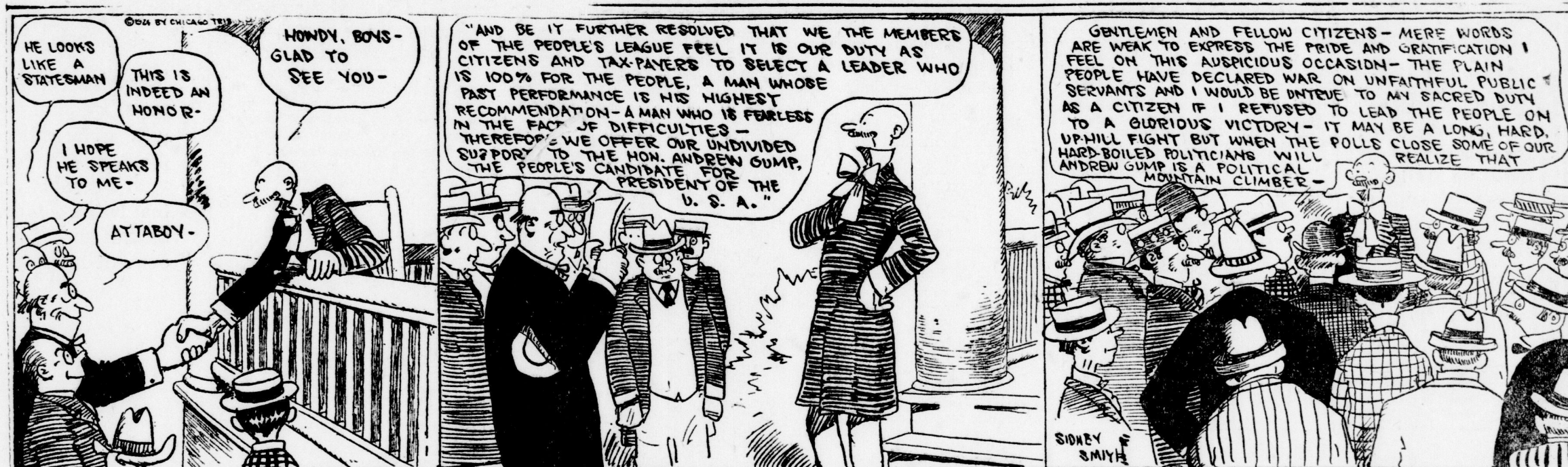

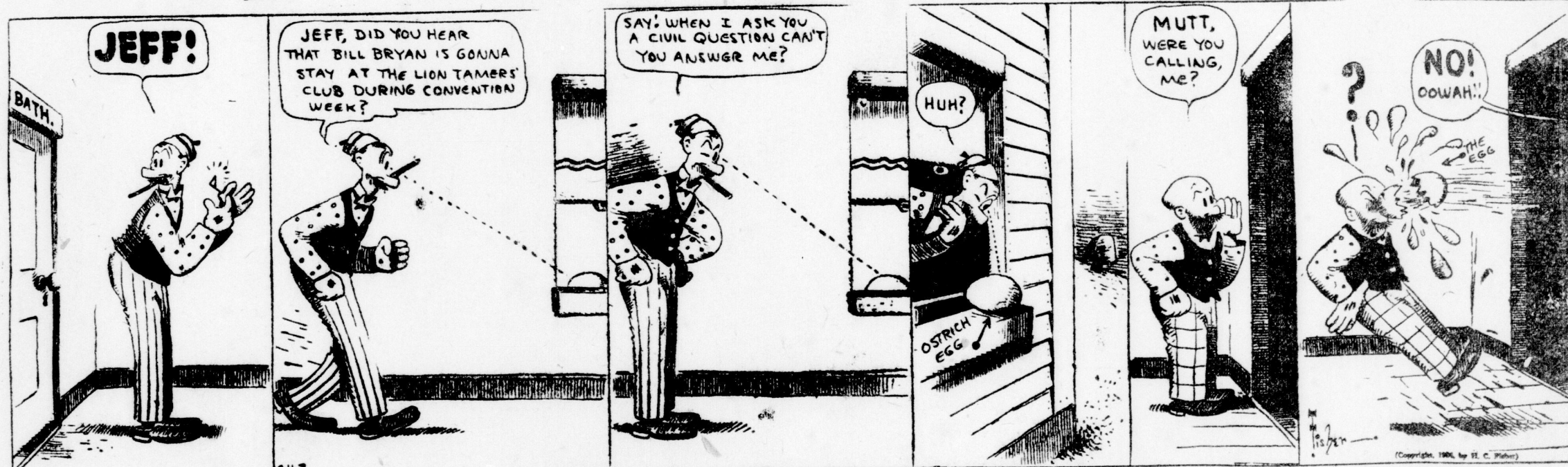
