Wetzel Buys Former Mint League Player From Waterbury Club.

Associated Press Despatch. Columbus, Ohio, April 9.—Manager Buzz Wetzel of the Hamilton M. O. League Club, early this morning announced the purchase of Ernie Neitzke from the Waterbury team, in the Eastern League.

Neitzke is an outfielder and pitcher. He was with the Saginaw team in the Michigan-Ontario League last season, and is a clouter of real worth. He can take his turn in the box and play in the outfield.

Followers of the Ohio State team remember Neitzke from last year, when, during the training trip, he broke up several games by his long hits.

Rain, which fell on Monday morning, and a hard wind, which followed, made the workout rather easy for the players. A short batting practice was followed by some bunting work under the towers of the stadium.

Ontario Olympic Trials Will Be Held in Toronto On April 18.

Toronto, April 9.—Long-distance runners throughout the province are preparing for the Ontario Olympic trials, which are to be held in Toronto over a 19-mile modified marathon course on April 18 (Good Friday). The most promising performers in this trial as well as those to be held in the other provinces, will undergo a further test in the Canadian trials to be held in Montreal in June, following which the representatives of Canada at the Olympic games will be selected. Long-distance runners from the dominion have always been prominent contenders in these grueling races.

At this meeting it is the intention to broaden out as much as possible, to take in every sport, and to put each sport in the hands of men best qualified to handle it.

There is really nothing new in the idea. The L. A. A. A. has been trying to do this very thing for the past year with varying success.

There are few who oppose the principle of central government for athletics in a city the size of London and for those smaller in population. There are also surprisingly few who will get out and volunteer to work to make the principle a real success in operation.

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WOSSA TRACK MEET CLASSES ANNOUNCED

Arrangements Made To Hold Annual Event At Queen's Park May 17.
