

HYDRO EMPLOYEE IS ELECTROCUTED

John Pryce Touches High-Tension Wire—Thrown From Pole.

Albert John Pryce, 38 years old, of 204 Grey street, hydro-electric cableman, was killed Saturday afternoon, when his hand came into contact with a high tension wire. The shock threw him from the pole upon which he was working, and his head was badly crushed.

Pryce was fixing wires at the southwest corner of Talbot and Horton streets.

On the pole upon which he was working, about 30 feet from the ground, there is a small platform without a railing around it. It is surmised that Pryce losing his balance, seized a live wire. The platform being wet, a contact was immediately established. A current of about 15,000 volts passed through his body.

He was rushed to the hospital in a truck which had been standing nearby, but he died soon after being picked up. The body was removed to Oatman's undertaking parlors, where it was viewed by a jury. Coroner Dr. Robert Ferguson was called. The inquest will be held Tuesday night at the police station.

Pryce had been an employee of the hydro for about eight years.

The case is made particularly sad by the fact that he leaves five small children, between the ages of 2 and

14. Mrs. Pryce is a cripple, and has been practically confined to the house during the past two years. She had just arisen from a sickbed, and the catastrophe which has struck the house has prostrated her.

Survivors are his widow, four daughters, Jessie, Lorraine, Annie and Pearl; one son, Albert, 12 years old. He is also survived by one brother, John; and two sisters, Mrs. Jessie Tuttle and Miss Pearl Pryce.

Spirit of Brotherhood Pervades at Inaugurals At Eight City Churches

Only Former Methodist Congregations Affected by June Changes.

SEVEN OUTSIDERS

The compelling spirit of church union with confident predictions of a greater brotherhood in the future pervaded the inaugural sermons delivered in eight local United churches yesterday.

Former Methodist congregations only were affected by the June changes. Of the eight ministers to take over new pulpits, seven are from other points in the London conference, Rev. A. E. M. Thomson, M.A., B.D., having been transferred from Centennial church to Ridout Street church.

The eight changes involve three ministers who have held London pulpits on previous occasions: Mr. Thompson at Centennial church; Rev. George N. Hazen, D.D., Elmhurst, who comes to the city for a second term at Centennial church and who also was minister of Wellington street church for a term; and Rev. B. H. Robinson, M.A., Leamington, who was pastor for a term of Robinson Memorial church.

The list includes also three former presidents of the London Methodist conference: Mr. Thomson, of course, who was the unanimous choice at the last conference held here a few weeks ago; Dr. Hazen, who was

president in 1914, and Rev. J. W. Hibbert, Kingsville, who was president in 1921.

The Christian church is not a Noah's Ark where people may flee for safety, neither is it an insurance company which guarantees a stated condition for the future, Dr. Hazen told the morning congregation at the Centennial church. His subject was "Some Essentials of a Successful Church."

An Everyday Service. There is an everyday service to fulfill if the Christian is to be worthy of his name, the speaker asserted. It is not enough for the members of a church to leave evil things behind, they must press forward and do good things.

Comparing the relation which should exist between Christ and His church to the connection between the mind and the body, he said that just as the body expresses itself through the impulses from the mind, so the church should react to the influence of God.

"The body is the servant of the will; so should the Christian church be the servant of Christ," he stated. "The first essential of a successful church is that each member be in communion with God."

"The second essential may also be explained through the body. It has various organs, which are, by nature, united to each other. So it is in the church. We are all partakers of one divine nature. Brotherhood is vital in the Christian church. See how these Christians love one another," was the comment made when Christianity was struggling for a foothold. "Love thy neighbor as thyself," says Jesus.

"Our bodies were created for a very important mission, that of giving the spirit a medium of expression. Just as the eyes, the heart, the lungs and the hands are all necessary to the proper functioning of the body, so are each of us necessary to the welfare of the Christian church."

COUNTY BREEDERS RETURN OFFICERS

Middlesex Livestock Association Holds Annual Meeting—Rapidly Advancing.

So successful have been the operations of the Middlesex Livestock Breeders' association in the first year of its existence that all the officers were returned at the annual meeting held in the department of agriculture office Saturday afternoon.

E. S. Little was re-elected hon. president; Col. Robert McEwen, Byron, president; S. P. Brown, Coldstream, first vice-president; R. A. Finn, secretary-treasurer; and directors, who were also re-elected, are: A. Nicholson, Parkhill, representing the Shorthorn breeders; A. E. Perry, Appin, Herefords; Robert McEwen, Byron, Angus; S. P. Brown, Holstein; E. S. Little, Jerseys, and W. J. Connolly, Strathroy, Ayrshires.

In opening his address to the 50 members present, Col. McEwen pointed out that the winnings of the Middlesex breeds at the great international show at Chicago last year were greater than any one state in the American union. He hoped that Middlesex would keep up this enviable record.

Col. McEwen stated he was more than pleased at the reception the officers of the association had been receiving from the farmers, and declared that the coming year would be most successful. He pointed out that a good sire was absolutely necessary in order to have success in livestock breeding.

Secretary R. A. Finn, giving his report for the year, stated that \$500 had been paid out in bonuses to 125 breeders, who had purchased pure-bred sires for the first time.

Three bacon hog clubs had been formed during the year, two more being in process of formation. Three hog-buyers were already buying hogs on grade and more have signified their intention of buying in this manner.

Mr. Finn said: "A pig club organized in the county for the boys and girls, had been most successful, winning \$25 a head, money, \$70, in car lot prizes at Toronto stock yards."

After some discussion by the members, the executive was empowered to take up the menace of grade bulls running at large, with the livestock branch at Toronto. The authorities will also be asked to have bulls that have been approved by the association, tubercular tested when sold. The campaign against scrub bulls will be continued vigorously this year.

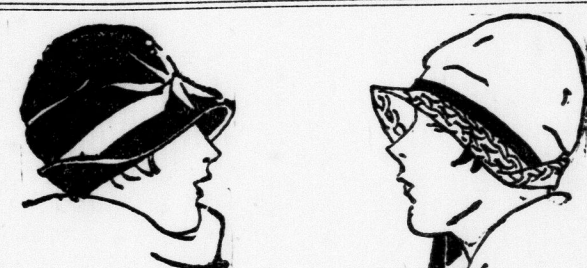
