

SUTHERLAND'S NAG WOBBLY AT KNEES

Progressive Attacks S. Oxford
Tory—Riding Swings
To Innes.

Tillsonburg, Oct. 12.—Another week of political organizing came to an end on Saturday evening in the historic riding of South Oxford, and on Tuesday the speaking campaign starts with real vigor. Tuesday evening a huge Liberal rally is being held in the Mason arena, with Hon. George P. Graham as the principal speaker. Addresses will also be given by Mrs. Harry Carpenter of Hamilton, Hon. George R. Smith, manager of the Dalley Corporation, Hamilton, and the candidate, J. W. Innes.

Donald Sutherland, the Conservative candidate, is holding meetings in the rural centers, in an effort to swing the farmer vote to his support, but is meeting with very small audiences. The worm is turning, and there is a distinct swing to the Liberal candidate in every polling subdivision. For years Donald Sutherland has been recognized as one of the priests of high protection in Western Ontario, and his only hope for re-election lies with the voters of Ingersoll and Tillsonburg.

Has Town Support.
In the last election the Liberal candidate, M. G. Dean, actually polled a majority of seven in Tillsonburg, with 106 Progressive votes polled, who are all supporting Mr. Innes this election.

It certainly must cause great consternation in the Conservative ranks to know that the heads of some of the largest manufacturing concerns in Ingersoll and Tillsonburg have already signed the Liberal candidate's nomination papers.

The farmers in general have vote against the Conservative candidate for three elections, but in the last two contests have elected Donald Sutherland on a minority vote, and have decided emphatically to stand by J. W. Innes, Liberal candidate. On Thursday evening the chairman at the Conservative meeting in Mount Elgin invited opposition speakers, and nearly lost his breath when C. C. Hawkins, a well-known Progressive worker, accepted the invitation and challenged several statements of the Conservative candidate and defended the Liberal candidate.

Hyphen Candidate.
Mr. Hawkins' speech part was as follows: "They (the Conservatives) made much of Mr. Innes on the Liberal-Progressive proposition and they ask what it is. They speak at length of his riding two horses. Mr. Sutherland here is a Liberal-Conservative, and they say nothing of that, and I cannot for the life of me see why there is not as much reason for Mr. Innes being a Liberal-Progressive as there is for Mr. Sutherland being a Liberal-Conservative."

"I am glad Mr. Innes can ride two horses, as Mr. Sutherland says, I am afraid Mr. Sutherland has but one, and it appears to be badly gone at the knees."

"Mr. Sutherland likes to twist us of the U. F. O. going into the Liberal fold. I was a U. F. O. myself and I would ask you where else would we go. He has called us wreckers and Bolsheviks."

This started the fireworks, and a very interesting situation arose as Mr. Sutherland had arisen to his feet, and facing Mr. Hawkins with the words: "That is absolutely false, sir, and you know it," replied Mr. Sutherland.

"I have read it in the papers myself," answered Mr. Hawkins.

"I say that I never called them such a thing, that statement was false and you know it," replied Mr. Sutherland.

"I never have," said Mr. Hawkins.

This is an indication that South Oxford is going to witness the hottest campaign in its history, and already rumors are flying from the Conservative clubrooms that in case their candidate is defeated another safe riding will be opened to place him at Ottawa.
