HOLIDAY TRUCE.

Quiet Reigns In Turbulent Mexico, But Not For Long.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—Apparent quiet in the Mexican situation was interpreted here yesterday by officials as merely a "holiday armistice" and temporary. Strategists believe that Gen. Villa, the rebel leader, whose victories already have placed him in the forefront of the Constitutionalists, will press his campaign southward with a view to carrying the warfare into the Federal district to compete with Gen. Huerta for the mastery of the Mexican capital. Official reports received here yesterday were meagre. Rear Admiral Fletcher, commanding the American squadron in Mexican gulf waters, reported his departure on the flagship Rhode Island from Tampico for Vera Cruz. As his recent laconic despatches from Tampico have told repeatedly of the restoration of order in that lately disturbed section, it is believed he has gone to Vera Cruz to assign to proper stations the battleships which arrived there to relieve the vessel about to return to home waters. As Admiral Fletcher is directing the battleship manoeuvres, his own direction, officials thought, the night return without notice to Tampico, where further hostilities may ensue as a result of rebel determination to gain control of a port of entry on the gulf coast.

TELEGRAPH BRIEFS.

Alfred Sleith of London was instantly killed at Glencoe by a Wabash express just after alighting from the G.T.R. flyer.
The dwelling of the late Archibald Angle of Moulton, Ont., occupied by two families, was destroyed by fire with contents.
Mrs. George Chambers, aunt of W. C. Chambers, M.P.P., was seriously injured when a runaway team dashed into his motor car.
The death occurred Wednesday of Peter McKee, one of Ayr's oldest and most highly-esteemed citizens, at the age of 71. He was born in Scotland. Among the items in the account paid by the council of the Township of Bertie in Welland County, is one to C. D. Hawkins for \$4 for feeding tramps.
Charles Crombie, proprietor of the new St. Charles' restaurant, at Midland while eating oysters, came on a pearl as large as a bean, shaped like a pyramid.
George Keit, a lake sailor, whose parents had given him up for lost in the great storm of Nov. 9, walked into their home at Harrison on Christmas Eve.
A cow owned by Frank Furry, who resides on a farm about three miles west of Welland, gave birth to triplet calves, each calf weighing about fifty pounds.
While a G.T.R. freight train was stalled in the Brockville yards, a light engine following overtook and crashed into a shunter, instantly killing Daniel Cahill.
Silas Winter of Lunenburg, Ont., was found dead in a culvert on the G.T.R. track just east of Cornwall Wednesday afternoon. He had evidently been overtaken by a train in the storm.
Only a vehicle owned by a candidate for his private use may be used by him in conveying voters to the polls on Jan. 1, is the new law in the Municipal Act. Hiring vehicles would void the election of a candidate.
Dominion Central of Toronto narrowly escaped death last night when he was attacked by a relative with an axe while lying down. He received a bad wound behind the ear and on the neck, which required a number of stitches.
To Separate "Siamese" Twins.
PARIS, Dec. 26.—"Siamese" twin girls, a month old, who were joined face to face by a strip of flesh over an inch thick, between the two stomachs, have been brought to Paris to be separated by a surgical operation. A radiograph examination suggests that the twins have no vital organs in common. They fight so ferociously and continually with their little hands that they had to be clothed with woollen vests inside which their arms were imprisoned. This, however, does not prevent them from doing their best to bite each other.

ROYALTY'S CHRISTMAS

British Sovereign and Family Had a Quiet Day.

Rideau Hall Also the Scene of an Old English Celebration—One Hundred Thousand Fed in New York—Riot in Los Angeles—Niagara Falls Couple Got a Set of Triplets From Santa Claus.
LONDON, Dec. 26.—The royal family spent Christmas at York Cottage, Sandringham, His Majesty's Norfolk estate, where all the old customs on which the late King Edward insisted were observed, and it was just a homely gathering. Their Majesties were surrounded by all their children except Prince Albert, who is with the Mediterranean fleet.
For dinner every famous Christmas dish appeared; turkeys, of which no fewer than fifty were roasted in the Sandringham kitchens, followed by roast baron of beef and plum pudding—an enormous one which made an almost state entrance between two footmen with powdered wigs, scarlet and gold coats, white satin breeches and pink silk stockings. The afternoon was taken up with games, in which Princess Victoria took a leading part. After tea the children's Christmas tree was lighted up and stripped of its presents, which were distributed among the family.
The royal family will remain at Sandringham until Jan. 12, when the Court will return to Windsor.
King George, like his father, is never so happy as when he is living the life of an English country gentleman, and while at Sandringham all the ceremonies of the Court were laid aside and King George, in the bosom of his family, leads as simple an existence as any of the squires in the district.
Christmas at Rideau Hall.
OTTAWA, Dec. 26.—Christmas Day was spent at Rideau Hall in typical old English fashion. Every member of the household was the recipient of a present from the Duke and Duchess of Connaught and Princess Patricia from the humblest page boy to Col. Farquhar, the military secretary. This was not the only manifestation of the Christmas spirit at Rideau Hall, for there was a big Christmas tree given by their Royal Highnesses in the evening, at which every member of the household was invited, and the presents were distributed from it by Princess Patricia. The big tree was set in the centre of the ball room.
The Duke and Princess Patricia attended service in the morning in St. Bartholomew's Church. Residents of the capital made this Christmas a regular home day.

Hundred Thousand Dined.
NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—Well-attended church services and the distribution of Christmas dinners to nearly 100,000 of the city's dependents were the features of New York's observance of the day of hospitality.
The Salvation Army led in the distribution of Christmas cheer. In addition to issuing 5,000 Christmas dinner baskets, each of them containing food enough for six, the organization entertained 3,500 children with a Christmas tree party. Commander Eva Booth presided at this and personally distributed the presents.
One of the notable events of the day was the celebration organized by the "spugs," or Society for the Prevention of Useless Giving. Over 11,000 adults and children, rich and poor, attended its Christmas tree party, at which presents, coffee, cake, sandwiches and candy were distributed.
Riot in Los Angeles.
LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 26.—Rafael Adames, a Mexican, was killed, and five policemen were injured yesterday in a riot at the Plaza, when the officers started to break up a meeting of several hundred unemployed and hungry men. Twenty of the rioters were arrested.
When the police arrived on the scene and began to clear the streets, stones were thrown and clubs used by the men who had been listening to speeches. Adames was one of the leaders in resisting, and was shot by an officer.
Although the rioters put up a vigorous fight, none were armed, and the police suffered injuries from clubs and stones only. The Plaza finally was cleared, and the disturbance ended.

Released For Christmas.
OGDEN, Utah, Dec. 26.—With their promise to return the only pledge, forty-five boys and young men serving terms at the Utah State Industrial School were released yesterday by Supt. E. G. Gouans, after a special ruling by the board of trustees. They were all able to reach their homes in time to eat Christmas dinner, and will not return to the state school until Dec. 29.
A Real Christmas Present.
NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Dec. 26.—A bounteous Christmas present was left at the home of Mr. and Mrs. F. Tiller, Victoria avenue, when the stork paid a visit and left triplets, all boys. The mother and babes are all doing well.

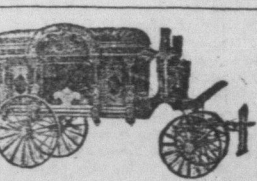
