THE CZAREWITZ STABBED

A JAP ATTACKS THE HEIR TO THE RUSSIAN THRONE.

The despatch says the attack upon the heir to the Russian throne was made yesterday and that the scene of the attempted assassination was at Otzu, on Lake Biwa, 12 miles from the former capital of Japan, on West-Kioto, now officially called Sakai.
