His innings lasted about 3 hours and consisted of 91 hits as above all round the wicket, and not one being the semblance of a chance. The two first and nine of the four were run out, and 23 were boundary hits. Mr. Lyon never passed the century mark before, but he did it yesterday with a vengeance. The performance is all the more creditable as Rosedale, Peterboro's pro, is a first-class tricky bowler, and the team besides includes good trundling talent. Parker and Burnham were the only visitors who did not try their hand with the ball. Lyon took two overs before luncheon and then batted from 3 o'clock to 6 without disaster.
