Sir Geo. Ross, former Liberal Premier of Ontario, said: "In my judgment the commerce of Canada should never be placed at the therey of the United States Congress or any other competing nation. We have adapted our transportation now to British trade. To enter into a reciprocity treaty with the United States would be dependent upon the humor of our American neighbors and would be to discount all this expenditure. Commercially I cannot bring myself to look with favor upon a reciprocity treaty under existing circumstances with a people who have specifically framed a tariff for our injury."

The Hon. Clifford Sifton, said, "reciprocity will reverse the conditions that have made a successful policy for Canada and will spell retrogression, commercial subordination and destruction of our national ideals and our proud position as the rising hope of the British Empire."

The Bell Telephone Company undertake to build their lines to the corporate lim-its of both Alvinston and Watford at their its of both Alvinston and Watford at their own expense and there connect with Municipal System. The Bell Co. are to do all the switching and office work for \$2 per subscriber per year. The arrangements as to service are as follows:—Free service to all Brooke subscribers on the Municipal System and free service with all Bell subscribers in Alvinston and Watford to Brooke subscribers connecting at all Bell subscribers in Avinston and water ford to Brooke subscribers connecting at those points only. If a Brooke subscriber connecting at the Alvinston exchange desires to speak to a Watford Bell subscriber there will be a toll charge of five cents or vice versa. That portion of the Bell System known as the Sutorville line has been purchased by the township and will become part of the Municipal
