The Municipality of the Township of Howard in the County of Kent, in ursuans to the Act of the beginning of Ontario, passed in the forty dirst year of Her Majesty's reign chaptered nine, and the amendment thereto, chaptered eight, of 1879, emets as follows:

Isr.—That the Recve of the said township of Howard may, from time to time; subject to the provisions of the By Law, borrow on the credit of the Corporation of the said Mumicipality, such sums of money, not exceeding in the whole, Ten Thousand Dolars, as may be deemed by the said Council, and may in manner hereinafter provided, issue debentures of the said Corporation in sums of On-Hindred Dollars each, for the amount so borrowed, the said behentures to have coupons attached, as provided in the fourth section of the said first mentioned Act.

2xn.—That when the Council shall be of opinion that the application of any person or persons who may be assessed as owners of said in the said municipality, to borrow money for the purpose of constructing sile, stone or timber drains, should be granted in whole or in part, then the said Council may, by resolution, instruct the said Recve to issue debentures as aforcead, and borrow such sum of money as does not exceed the amount applicad for, and loan the same to the said applicant or applicants on the completion of their respective drainage works.
