The engagement of Miss Annie Fraser, daughter of the Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia, to Rev. W. G. Wilson, of St. Andrew's church, Guelph, is announced.

Charles R. Crockett, of South Farmington, is sending out a very handsome travelling wagon, advertising his preparation, Tuttle's Ellis.

L. D. Shaffer's new vessel is nearly finished, and will be off the stocks on the 17th. A force of nearly thirty men are engaged on the finishing. She will be the finest vessel launched here for many years.

Arthur S. Barnstead, the secretary of industries and immigration, is touring the Valley in order to gather information that will be useful to him in the conduct of this newly organized provincial department.

Salmon has been quite plentiful in the market during the week, a number of large catches having been taken on the Bay shore. It is still selling at 20 cents a pound here, though a Truro paper quotes a market price of 16 cents for steak.

Outlook.—We understand that Mr. A. D. Wilkins has sold his farm in Brooklyn, and is likely to purchase the property of Mr. James Gates beside the Methodist church in Middleton. Mr. Gates in that case will move to Wilmet.

The marriage of W. E. Tupper, manager of the Union Bank of Halifax, Digby, and Miss Kathleen Viole, daughter of J. M. Viole, collector of customs, Digby, takes place at Holy Trinity church on Wednesday, June 10th.

The family of C. F. DeWitt is expected here from New York today to occupy their country residence for the summer. Mr. DeWitt has been here for several weeks looking after his farm, and has been domiciled, while awaiting his family's arrival at the Grand Central.

The brick yard of C. L. Piggett, formerly the International Brick and Tile Company, presents a busy appearance. They are putting out about 20,000 brick a day. Fifteen to twenty men are employed in the yard. Last year the demand for bricks exceeded the output of the works, and apparently the output of the present year will meet a good market.

The death occurred at Wolfville on May 28th of Rev. George E. Tufts, brother of Professor Tufts of Acadia College. Mr. Tufts was born in Albany, Annapolis county, in 1843, and graduated from Acadia College in 1866. He was a most successful pastor, and had rare ability as a sympathetic friend and preacher. Most of his pastorates have been in the United States.

The Royal is becoming quite popular. The attendance last week was above the average and on Saturday night the house was packed. The management have been fortunate in securing Mr. Louis Trevor, a New York baritone, who will be here the remainder of the week. The Boston Post says:—The will of the late Lavinia Hunting, of Malden which involves public bequests to the amount of \$45,000, has been contested by the nephew of the deceased John E. Pearson, of Nova Scotia. The respondent has filed a protest against the filing of the will, through the office of Crofton H. McLeod, of Boston, and will come on to Cambridge from Annapolis county, Nova Scotia, within a few days to uphold his claim. Mr. McLeod is a clever Nova Scotian, and is fast making a name for himself in his profession.

Work of the construction of the new railway bridge at Weymouth is commenced.

It is reported that the water in the reservoir is quite low and it will be necessary to turn on the lake supply this week.

Lieut. E. C. Schaffner, Capt. G. H. Vroom, Capt. F. W. Bishop, of the 6th regiment, will be members of the Nova Scotia team at the Inter-maritime Rifle Match at Charlottetown to-morrow, Thursday.

The marriage of Miss Bessie M. Ganser, sister of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Ganser, of Bellefleur, to Mr. Frederick W. McAndrews, of Bridgetown, is announced to take place on the evening of June 24th, at the home of the bride.

Mr. A. H. Foster, son of Wallace W. Foster, formerly of Upper Granville, Mr. E. H. Fitch, Mr. Earl Parson, Mr. Harry Fitch, and chauffeur, all of Malden, Mass., are touring the province, camping out and fishing. They are travelling in one of the finest touring cars that has ever visited the province, and passed through Bridgetown on Saturday.

The June term of the Supreme Court opens here next Tuesday, the 16th, Judge Neagher presiding. We are informed that there is a very short docket. There is one criminal case, arising out of a disputed title to land in the western end of the County. Also an action for damages for loss of goods, in which McKenzie Crowe and Company are the plaintiffs, and the C. F. R. the defendants.

An Ottawa Despatch says:—The militia training camps will be held this year as usual, although the dates named in the original orders may have to be postponed in some cases, the Opposition having consented to allow the estimates for militia training to go through without further observation. The department is also arranging for the mobilization of about twelve thousand troops at Quebec during the last week of July.

A third Acadia College forward movement asking for \$500,000 was started at a meeting of influential Maritime Baptists, who had gathered at Wolfville for the closing exercises. One leading merchant of St. John has already subscribed \$5,000 and another merchant of the same place has put himself down for \$1,000. It is believed that \$100,000 will be raised by the Baptists of the three provinces, and that the remaining \$400,000 will be found at a certain city in the state of Ohio.
