The Free Press has had from time to time descriptions of the new church presents a very fine appearance. Street. The appearance of the exterior of the edifice, which is of brick veneer a handsomely painted roof, is attractive and highly creditable to the enterprise of the congregation, but the beauty of prise and admiration. Even the second space of the church has cost Blessed Virgin. Renaud, his foreman, has been with him twelve years; and the work does great credit, both to his own cleverness and skill, and to his success in training and superintending those who have labored under him.
