



OF THE LATE HARRY JAMES.

OTTAWA, Dec. 29.—A benefit fund for the late Harry James, veteran lacrosse and football player, was opened in Ottawa this morning, and up to toninght nearly two hundred dollars had been subscribed. James died on Dec. 5, after a prolonged illness. James was born in Brampton in 1865, and learned his lacrosse with the Brampton Excelsiors and the Orangeville twelve. In 1887 he joined the Capitals, and for the next nine years was prominent in lacrosse and football circles. Among the largest contributors to the fund are Harry Ketchum, Hugh Carson, P. D. 
