4. No tenders were received for this installation. At the request of the Post Office Department, a contract was negotiated with G. W. King of Canada Limited, Burlington, Ontario, who were the sole manufacturers of the Stanrun chain trolley type of conveyor. I am informed that officers from the engineering branch of the Post Office Department had seen applications of the conveyor in the United Kingdom postal service. They believed that it would not only solve the special requirement at the Hamilton post office, but was the type of conveyor they wished to install as an experimental unit.

6. I am informed by the postal authorities that the use of the conveyor was discontinued on February 22, 1965, because it could not be kept in a reliable working condition. Continued efforts to operate it would have disrupted the handling of mail in the Hamilton post office.

### EXTERNAL AID BY CANADA

Question No. 769-Mr. Rynard:

1. What was the total amount of external aid given by Canada for the year 1966-67?

2. What are the names of the countries receiving the above external aid and what was the amount each country received?

Hon. Paul Martin (Secretary of State for External Affairs): 1. Parliament appropriated \$207.7 million in 1966/67 for Canada's bilateral aid programs. In addition, credits authorized for developing countries under Section 21-A of the Export Credits Insurance Act amounted to \$61.7 million. Total allocations to developing countries in 1966/67 also included \$11.7 million in uncommitted development loan funds appropriated in earlier fiscal years. The total bilateral aid program consequently amounted to \$281.2 million.
