I recently spoke with the new premier of the Northwest Territories, Nellie Cournoyea. Of course there are matters that will continue to be under discussion. I might remind members that the formula financing initiative led to an increase in per capita funding into the Northwest Territories in the past year as compared to previous years. This is a very generous and appropriate means of ensuring adequate fiscal support and fiscal arrangements with the Government of the Northwest Territories.
