

SURROGATE COURT SCHEDULE OF FEES

Revision by County Judges Now Ratified by Sir William Meredith.

LATTITUDE ALLOWED

Judge May Alter Scale in Special Cases Subject to Appeal.

A new schedule of Surrogate court fees drawn up by the board of county judges, has been ratified by Sir William Meredith, chief justice of Ontario.

It becomes operative on March 2, 1914
Its provisions are: "Drawing all necessary papers and proofs to lead, grant, and obtaining order for probate or letters of administration in ordinary cases and taking out some ordinary cases and taking out some ordinary cases." ing out same:

"When value of property devolving is \$1000 or under, \$10; over \$1000 and not exceeding \$5000, \$15; over \$5000 and not exceeding \$10,000, \$20; over \$10,000 and not exceeding \$20,000, \$30; over \$20,000 and not exceeding \$50.000, \$50; over \$50,000 and not exceeding \$100,000, \$75; over \$100,000, \$100; in cases of temporary admin-\$100; in cases of temporary admin-latration, \$10; on application to revoke any grant. \$10.

"Any increase must be at discre-tion of the judge, in cases of special

"In all contentious cases and proceedings not hereinbefore provided for, the same fees and disbursements as are provided for in the county court, so far as the same may be applicable. may be charged and allowed on taxation.
"In addition to the foregoing, all proper disbursements made by the solicitor shall be allowed.

BUDAPEST. Jan. 28 .- (Can. Press.)-Armed guards were called into the lower house of the Hungarian Parliament today to eject unruly members of the opposition during a debate on the press reform law.
