

take the Place, burn the Houses, and demolish the Fort; which was accordingly effected.

On the 30th of *April*, between Nine and Ten in the Morning, the Fleet having the main Body of the Troops on board came to an Anchor in *Chapeau-rouge Bay*; at the Distance of about two Miles from *Flat Point Cove*: Upon the Discovery of this the Enemy fired some Cannon, and rang their Bells in the Town, to alarm and call in their People living in the Environs, and sent out of the Town a Detachment of about 150 Men, under the Command of Mr. *Boularderie*, late an Officer in one of the Regiments in *France*, to oppose the landing of the Troops; whereupon the General made a Feint of landing a Party of his Men in Boats at *Flat Point Cove*, in order to draw the *French* thither (which had its Effect) and upon a Signal from the Vessel those Boats returned, and joined another Party under his Stern, from whence were landed two Miles higher up the Bay, about 100 Men, before the Enemy could get up there; whom they briskly attack'd, though under the Advantage of being covered with their Woods, and after killing six of them upon the Spot, taking as many Prisoners, (among whom was Mr. *Boularderie*), and wounding several others, forc'd the Remainder to make a precipitate Flight towards the Town, in which some others were taken Prisoners, with the Damage sustained on the Part of the *English*, of only two Men being
