

Detroit, Dec. 1.—Chris Smith, the Algonac boat builder, has challenged the owner of Whip-Po'-Will Jr. to a 90-mile race to decide the speed superiority of the Miss Detroit III, and the Lake George craft. Smith suggests that the race be staged at Miami. If it goes to Florida, the match will probably become the feature of the annual winter power-boat regatta staged by the Biscayne Bay Yacht Club.

Gar Wood, who drove Miss Detroit III. to her championship in the Gold Cup here last September, has obtained the consent of the owners of the craft to race against the Whip, and Smith, as the builder, is issuing the challenge to Commodore A.
