The correspondent adds that the government troops, in accordance with martial law, shot a number of members of the red guard who had been captured, while a mob attacked others of the captured reds and tried to kill them.

Mr. Chamberlain said that of the total expenditures for 1918-1919, 34.4 per cent. had been provided from revenue and the rest by borrowing. The British record in this respect during the last five years, he added, was one which no other belligerent would equal
