ALD. DOUGLASS TOO WILLING A WORKER

Does Not Skirk the Responsibility of Making Appointments.

Members of the Board of Works Chose Their Chairman.

The board of works held a regular meeting last night, with all the members present. Chairman Douglass was catechised about some appointments he had recently made. "What's the use of having a chairman if he don't work?" said Ald. Garratt, laughing. "What's the use of the committee, if the chairman does all the work?" said Ald. Wilkey, with righteous indignation. This was after Ald. Douglass, in response to pointed questions by Ald. Farrall, had admitted making an appointment of which the engineer's department knew nothing until the man's time came in. About a week ago he had appointed George Leadbitter assistant at Queen's Park.

A complaint about the condition of Maple street, East London, by P. G. Jean, was presented by Ald. Parnell, and referred to the engineer and members of the ward.

E. J. Pratt wrote, asking that John Ford's property at the corner of Dundas and Charlotte streets, be drained. It has been flooded four times this year. Referred to the engineer to report.

Secretary Jared Vining, of Choraz-in Lodge, I. O. F., asked to have fire escapes on the East End Hall, on the top floor of which is the lodge room. Referred to the engineer and Chairman Douglass.

The petition of Wm. Tackaberry and others on the south side of York street, from Talbot to Ridout, was laid on the table until the estimates are brought down.

Eden offered a three-acre gravel pit, at the corner of Talbot and Regent streets, for \$800. He understood the present pit was about used up. Ald. McPhillips wanted the matter referred to the engineer. Ald. Wilkey advocated getting a gravel pit on Egerton street. Ald. Parnell said there was no more need of a new gravel pit than a fifth wheel to a cart. It was decided to take no action.

At the meeting, Ald. Garratt moved a reconsideration. On a vote of 3 to 2 the chairman declared a reconsideration in order, and it was decided to look at several available sites.

Thomas Burns and Richard Swaisland asked for damages sustained by them by reason of the condition of the street at the corner of Forward street and Egerton street.

Burns and Swaisland were driving, and their horse was seriously injured by falling into a hole. The amount asked was \$30. Referred to the engineer.

Two tenders were received for the construction of a sewer on the Ridgeway, South London. Harding & Leathorne were successful at \$349, and 20 cents for side drains, their tender being the lowest.

Applications for assistant caretaker at Queen's Park, were received from Thomas Plinton, Wm. Gibson, Thomas Conrick, Wm. Wilson, Matthew Mains, George Leadbitter. The last was elected on the basis of the lowest bid.

The election of inspectors of the permanent walks in the city was a difficult task. There were only three applicants. Frank Hayman, Samuel Flory and Wm. Taylor. On the first ballot Mr. Taylor was declared elected, and it was decided he should be on duty north of Dundas street.

Mr. Flory was elected three or four second choice votes. Mr. Taylor was elected 3 to 2, then years and nays were called, and Mr. Hayman was elected 3 to 2.

The board must have the suspension of the engineer's department in view. Ald. Douglass wanted an inspector of plank walks appointed, and Ald. Reed wanted to create a position for "inspector of kerbing." Ald. Parnell vigorously opposed the steps, and no action was taken.

Information will be obtained about the Finch wood preservative. It has been used with good effect on plank walks in Toronto, Mr. Ironside said.

To Manitoba and Northwest conference—Rev. F. A. Buckley, from Nova Scotia conference, June 7; Rev. W. Bradford, from Montreal conference, forthwith; Rev. W. E. Wiggins, from Montreal conference, June 7; Rev. R. K. Peck, from Newfoundland conference, forthwith.

To Nova Scotia conference—Rev. Selby Jefferson, from Newfoundland conference, forthwith, June 14.

To the British Columbia conference—Rev. W. J. Sippel, from Hamilton conference, forthwith; Rev. E. E. Scott, from Toronto conference, forthwith.

RATTLE OF THE RAIL

The New Joint Freight Classification.

Grand Trunk and C. P. R. Reaching After Ohio Coal Fields.

After waiting for the approval of the governor-general for the past three months, the new joint freight classification of the Canadian railways will finally receive sanction this week. It will take effect May 15. A few changes have been made, but none of any account.

TOLEDO CONNECTIONS.

A Toledo telegram says: When closing a deal today to secure ten acres of land for yards, the officials of the new Detroit and Shore Line admitted that the Big Four, Canadian Pacific and Grand Trunk are interested in the line, Grand Trunk will be brought into Toledo, ultimately reaching the Ohio coal fields.

M. C. R. MEN KICK.

Brakemen on the Canadian section of the Michigan Central Railway, says the Detroit Free Press, are making a vigorous kick over a new order which went into effect two weeks ago. The company decided to use the accommodation trains which run over the line do not need a brakeman, and consequently those employees on the trains were laid off. Now the conductor has to go through the train and announce the next station, and has to assist the passengers on and off. Some of the trainmen resent the officials of the road in regard to the matter, and will ask that the brakemen be again placed on the route.

QUEEN'S DRIVER.

John Moon, an engine-driver on the Great Northern Railway of England, has just died at the age of 79. Moon became famous owing to the fact that on seventeen occasions he was selected to drive the Queen's train when her majesty traveled from Scotland to London. "Old Johnny Moon," as he was called in railway circles, was not only a competent driver, but without a complaint on one occasion he had the satisfaction of running the royal train into King's Cross twelve minutes before the booked time. Her majesty, discovering that the distance had been covered earlier than was anticipated, had a message conveyed to Moon to the effect that she would rather the train had been twelve minutes late than have the possibility of a mishap.

TEN-WHEEL PASSENGER ENGINE.

The Grand Trunk Railway has just turned out a locomotive which marks a radical change in the company's future engine-building for passenger service. The engine is known as a ten-wheel passenger engine, and is the first of the kind ever constructed by the company. Six others are under contemplation, and they will be all built in the same shops. One of these engines will do the work of two ordinary engines, and their use is rendered possible since the G. T. R. has strengthened the bridges on its system. The ordinary engine will at the most haul 50 coaches, but the new engine, according to the calculations of Mr. F. M. Morse, the designer, will draw 60 or even 65 loaded passenger coaches.

The engine, which will be put into service at once, is intended for the passenger service on the western division.
