OUR SPRING WATER.

Some advocates of the Matur scheme
are chucking over the fact that im-
purities have been found in the Mc-
Gregor springs, upon which the water
commissioners have relied to eke out
the supply during the coming summer.
The McGregor springs are no part of
the Springbank system, being at least
four miles from the present source of
supply. The condition of the water at
the McGregor farm has nothing to do
with the argument for or against
any scheme before the public.It is somewhat surprising to hear
from one or two medical gentlemen
that Springbank water conduces to
kidney trouble, because of an excess
of lime in it. One of these gives the
amount of lime as 13 grains to the
gallon. According to Bunge's "Physi-
ological and Pathological Chemistry,"
a standard authority, cow's milk con-
tains 128 grains of lime to the gallon,
yet cow's milk is considered a fairly
healthful beverage. The same authority
makes these statements: "Lime is the
only inorganic material which we have
to provide for in the choice of a child's
food. If brought up on meat and
bread a child would probably not ob-
tain the lime requisite for the growth
of its frame. In medical practice
rickety children are constantly being
ordered a couple of teaspoonfuls of
lime-water. This is useless, because
the amount ordered is far too small.
A saturated solution of lime contains
less lime than cow's milk." A promi-
nent local physician informs The Ad-
vertiser that lime in the spring water
in this city is positively beneficial to
the human system, if not to boilers
and pipes.It might be difficult, if not impossible,
for the opponents of spring water to
prove that there is an abnormal
amount of kidney disease in this city.
In any event, it is not an argument
that will shake the faith and pride of
the people of London in their spring
water. Strangers praise and envy the
city for the excellence of its water. The
poor is one the city will not give up
before a case is necessary.

THE CAYUGA LIBEL SUITS.

Like a score of Canadian dailies, The
Advertiser has been served with
notices, preliminary to suits for libel,
by the solicitors of Thomas McDonald
and Mrs. Mattie Perkins, of Cayuga.
The statements complained of were
published on the third page of the issue
of Feb. 22 last, and were as follows:
"McDONALD TO BE THE STAR
WITNESS—No Confession To Make
in the Cayuga Case, But Will Tell
Frank Story."
"Crown Attorney Murphy is pre-
paring a list of witnesses who will
appear on the preliminary hearing of
the murder charge against Mrs.
Mattie Perkins on Feb. 27. The sum-
mons will be served on Monday, and
those required to attend include
Thomas McDonald, the star crown
witness."The correspondent was informed
that there is not a flaw in the cir-
cumstantial evidence which will be
put in by the crown in its attempt
to prove murder. It will attempt to
show that Mrs. Perkins' infatuation
for Thomas McDonald was the mo-
tive."Would you marry me if Henry
died?" is the question she is alleged
to have put to McDonald.The foregoing paragraphs were re-
produced from a Toronto evening pa-
per, and on the part of this journal
there was, of course, no malice, and
no idea of prejudging the case. The
arrest or trial of any person on a
charge of murder is an event of deep
public interest, and people naturally
look to the newspapers for information.
In the paragraphs complained of the
correspondent stated what the prose-
cution claimed to be the motive of the
supposed crime, but there was no in-
tentional bias against the accused. The
same dispatch contained a statement by
the brother-in-law of Mrs. Perkins to
the effect that the case was due to the
enmity of some former friends, and
that the crown had nothing against her.
The headlines, which were the only
portions of the article for which this
newspaper was responsible, were, if
anything favorable to McDonald. On
April 17, a dispatch appeared in this
journal, stating that "considerable in-
dignation was caused when it became
known that Dr. Edge had been dropped
by the crown because he could not
see eye to eye with medical experts
from Toronto. The defense immediately
took advantage of the opportunity and
slandered him." Any intelligence like
this, favorable to the defense, was
given full publicity.If there was anything in the language
of the article published on Feb. 22
which passed the limits of fairness or
justice, The Advertiser regrets it. It
is many years since this journal hashad a libel suit on its hands, a proof
of the habitual caution exercised by
its news editors. Its readers can
vouch for the assertion that it is not
a journal of the sensational type, or
given to exploiting such cases as the
one in question. As to the latter, The
Advertiser can only repeat what it said
editorially the day after the verdict:
"The case for the crown in the Cayuga
murder trial was far from conclusive.
A verdict of guilty on such evidence
would have been hanging a woman on
the strength of village gossip."

ONTARIO'S MINERAL WEALTH.

An idea of Ontario's mineral devel-
opment, which was first given en-
couragement by the wise policy of the
late Liberal Government in opening up
the northern portion of the province
to the capitalist, the investor, and the
settler, may be gained by a perusal of
the report of the Bureau of Mines, for
1906, issued recently. The report places
the value of the mineral output for
last year at pretty close to eighteen
million dollars—an increase of 54 per
cent over the previous year, and ex-
ceeding all records. Of this amount
metallic products accounted for nearly
ten and a quarter millions, and non-
metallic for the remainder. Iron came
first in the metallic products, the
value being \$3,909,000, and nickel
second, with \$3,254,000. Silver account-
ed for \$1,873,000, while less than \$100,-
000 worth of gold was produced. Silver
showed the greatest development, the
output of last year exceeding that of
the preceding year by more than ten
to one. The production of both nickel
and iron was more than double that of
1904. Somewhat singular is the fact
that while the gold output surpassed
that of 1904 by more than 100 per cent,
it was only slightly over one-third that
of 1902. The output of brick and
cement, among the non-metallic prod-
ucts, practically broke even, there
being but a difference of \$1,000 between
them—\$1,937,000 of brick and \$1,936,000
of cement. Since 1901 the production
of cement has more than trebled, while
in the same time, the increase in the
output of brick has been only about
\$400,000—evidence enough that cement
is rapidly growing in popular favor as
a building material. The value of the
cement produced in 1906, from natural
rock is placed at \$1,738,000, and of
Portland, at \$152,000.The first great discovery of silver,
in 1868, was made at Silver Islet, Lake
Superior, and the second at Cobalt,
some 500 miles east. The fact that
there is a close resemblance in the ores
found in both cases leads Mr. Gibson,
the director of the bureau, to believe
that the country intervening may, when
explored, also be found rich in the
white metal.

THE WITTAKER PUMPED OUT

Freight Craft Sunk in Collision Suc-
cessfully Raised.Amherstburg, May 23.—Wrecking-
Master Baker has pumped out the
sunk steamer Wittaker, which has
lain on the bottom of the river near
Boise Blanc Island since Sunday
night, May 12, when the steamer
Gault and the Wittaker collided. Un-
expected difficulties were met, and
Capt. Baker has accomplished a good
job. The Wittaker will be taken to
the old Michigan Central dock, just
above the town, to allow of its corn
cargo being placed in freight cars for
Bramford. Two steam pumps keep the
boat afloat. Owing to the clearing of
the channel by the removal of the
wreck, both upbound and downbound
vessels are moving without delay for
the first time in ten days.

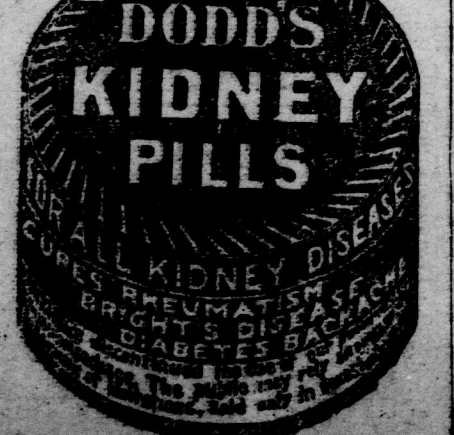

knife.CUT LIVE WIRE;
NERVY THIEF THISTakes 700 Feet of Wire Despite Heavy
Voltage Passing Through.Hamilton, May 23.—A nervy thief
appeared in the police court this
morning. He was Harry Smith, an
electrician, and the charge against him
was stealing 700 feet of copper feed
wire from the H. G. and B. Electric
Railway Company. Smith climbed a
pole east of the city limits and cut the
wire while a current of several hun-
dred volts were passing over it. He
protected himself by the use of a pair
of rubber gloves. Today he pleaded
guilty to the theft charge, and was re-

CHARGED WITH CONSPIRACY

Three Toronto Men Said to Have
Attempted Big Frauds.Toronto, May 23.—Cecil R. Elliott,
jeweler; Albert J. Hopkins, tailor, and
Norman Hopkins, telegraph operator,
were before the police magistrate this
morning on charges of conspiracy to
defraud. Albert Hopkins and Cecil
Elliott are charged jointly with con-
spiracy to defraud the Anglo-American
Insurance Company out of \$4,000;
Norman and Albert Hopkins are
charged with conspiracy to defraud the
Toronto Railway Company out of \$200,
and C. R. Elliott and Albert Hopkins
are charged with attempting to de-
fraud the Street Railway Company out
of \$485. The prisoners pleaded not
guilty, elected to be tried by jury and
were remanded till Tuesday for pre-
liminary examination. Bail was re-
fused.The charge against Albert Hopkins
and Cecil Elliott arises out of a fire
on the jewelry premises of Hopkins
on April 30. The stock was insured
in the Anglo-American for \$4,000. The
Hopkins brothers are alleged to have
developed the habit of falling off street
cars and then collecting damages from
the street railway company.

SIR WILFRID AT
FRENCH CAPITALSays Intermediate Tariff Will
Be Brought Into Play
in Europe.London, May 23.—The Paris corre-
spondent of the Express says Sir Wil-
frid Laurier has enabled him to state
that it is proposed to negotiate treaties
with certain countries, including
France, Italy and Switzerland. The
policy of the Canadian Government,
which is thoroughly understood and
appreciated by Downing street, may be
said to be the maintenance of the pre-
ference given Britain and the develop-
ment of trade with Britain's least
dangerous competitors under the inter-
mediate tariff.Sir Wilfrid Laurier believes that the
idea of colonial preference is growing
very fast in England. He entertains
a hope that it is being put into prac-
tice. For that reason it is unlikely that
he will consent to any scheme which
might prevent Canada at some future
date from joining in a commercial
union of the empire.The Standard's Paris correspondent,
confirming the statement in the Ex-
press, says he was struck by Sir Wil-
frid Laurier's perfect confidence in the
future of Canada, his loyalty to Great
Britain and the British Government,
and the practical philosophy with
which he accepted its decision on pre-
ferences, but as to the soundness and
wisdom of which he had great doubts.
It is evident that he regrets sincerely
the Government's refusal to take it up.
It appears certain that his attitude to-
wards the preference proposals at the
conference was dictated by the neces-
sity of admitting the fact that Britain
must judge what suits her best.

C. P. R. WINS BIG CASE

Relieved of \$200,000 Damage Suits Fol-
lowing a Collision.Vancouver, B. C., May 23.—By a
judgment given in the admiralty
court at noon today by Mr. Justice
Martin, the consolidated civil suits for
damages against the Canadian Pa-
cific Steamship Company, amounting
in all to about \$200,000, have been dis-
missed.The suits arose over the collision
between the Princess Victoria, owned
by the C. P. R. and the tug Chehalis,
of the Union Steamship Company's
fleet, which had been chartered by Mr.
Robert Bryce and party of fifteen to
go up the coast to inspect the oyster
beds. The Chehalis was sunk, and
nine people were drowned.At the investigation held immedi-
ately afterwards the C. P. R. was held re-
sponsible for the accident, and Capt.
Griffin's certificate canceled for six
months. Capt. Griffin was later tried
and acquitted on a charge of man-
slaughter, and the damage actions
were then instituted. Instead of trying
each action separately, the several
actions were consolidated. Robert
Bryce's was made a test case. In all
the damages asked were \$200,000. The
defendants moved for trial by jury
but the motion was refused by the full
court of Victoria, where the action was
tried.

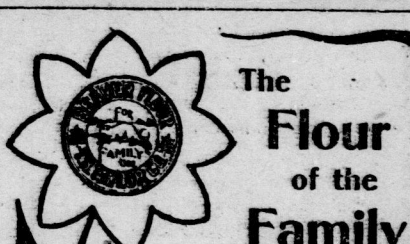
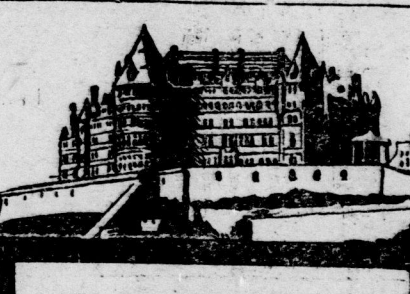
GOVERNMENT LAXITY.

the Premier said, "that it never oc-

is nothing to prevent the Dominion
Government prosecuting infractions of
