Live Stock Markets.
CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—Trade in cattle today was quite animated in desirable offerings, and cattle that were choice enough to bring over \$5 were stronger to a shade higher, while others were steady; choice steers, \$5.15 to \$5.70; medium, \$4.50 to \$5.10; beef steers, \$3.35 to \$4.40; stockers and feeders, \$3 to \$4; bulls, \$2.25 to \$4.25; cows and heifers, \$3.50 to \$4.25; calves, \$4.50 to \$5.70; western range, \$2.85 to \$4.50; fed western steers, \$4.10 to \$5; Texans, \$3.25 to \$4; Hogs—Fair to choice, \$3.50 to \$4.05; butchers, \$3.60 to \$4.05; mixed, \$3.70 to \$4.05; light, \$3.65 to \$4.05; pigs, \$3.25 to \$3.65. Choice lambs, \$3.75 to \$6.15; inferior, \$3.50 to \$4; western range lambs, \$5.25; native sheep, \$2.80 to \$4.50; western range, \$3.50 to \$4.40; feeders, \$4.25. Receipts, \$3.10 to \$4.70; hogs, 27,000; sheep, 20,000.

MONTREAL, Sept. 12.—About 500 head of butchers' cattle, 50 calves and 600 sheep and lambs were offered for sale at the east end abattoir today. The butchers were present in large numbers, and trade was fair, with prices about the same as on Thursday for pretty good cattle; common stock were not nearly so plentiful as on that day, and brought better prices. Mr. Martel bought twenty of the best cattle on the market at 45c per lb. Pretty good stock sold at from 35c to nearly 45c per lb. Common dry cows and starchy young stock sold at from 25c to 35c and Buffalo bulls at from 25c to 25c per lb. Calves sold at from \$2.50 to \$12 each, or from 35c to 45c per lb. Shippers pay from 35c to 45c per lb. for good large sheep; lambs sold at from 45c to 45c per lb. There were about 600 fat hogs at the stock yards, and they sold at from 45c to 50c per pound.

EAST BURLINGTON, Sept. 12.—Cattle—There were 220 loads on sale, including 31 loads of Canadian stockers; the proportion of desirable grades of export and choice handy fat butchers and the good kind of stockers was light, while the demand opened quite actively, at the opening of the sale of the export kind sold 10c to 15c higher than last Monday, on the basis of a scarcity, and a difference in values, and good handy fat butchers were 10c to 15c higher, being comparatively scarce; stockers of the top grades sold strong; but undergrades easier; fresh cows and springers were very scarce, only about 8 loads, and under an active demand were higher by fully 35c to 50c per head. Calves were in moderate supply—about 500 head; active demand and higher; at the close all the offerings were steady; good to best smooth, fat export steers, \$5.25 to \$5.40; good to best, \$4.35 to \$5.20; good to best butchers' steers, \$4.75 to \$5.15; common to good butcher steers, \$3.25 to \$3.65; heifers, good to best fat, \$4.15 to \$4.50; fair to good do, \$3 to \$3.25; cows, choice to extra, \$5.00 to \$5.25; good to choice, \$4.50 to \$5.00; sparsely, good to extra, \$3.50 to \$5.00; cows and calves, common to good, \$2.50 to \$3.00; calves, choice to extra, \$7.50 to \$7.75; good to choice, \$6.75 to \$7.25; calves, heavy, \$3 to \$5. lamb prices was \$6.25; the offerings were well cleaned up and the close was steady. Sir Wilfrid Laurier left Ottawa on Saturday for Arthabaskaville.

The Hamilton city council has voted \$500 to the relief of the New Westminster fire sufferers.

Rupert Cunningham, town clerk of Antigonish, N. S., dropped dead in his office Monday morning.

Winnipeg city council has passed a vote of \$500 for the relief of the New Westminster fire sufferers.

The bylaw to extend the Hamilton street railway franchise for fifteen years was adopted by the city council.

Robert Mackie, one of the Nanapanes bank robbery suspects, was released on bail and returned to his home in Belleville.

The Toronto board of control has voted \$1,000 for the relief of those thrown into destitution by the New Westminster fire.

The first consignment of Ontario fruit, packed according to California methods, was received in Winnipeg in excellent condition.

The official returns of admission receipts at the Industrial Exhibition show a total of \$97,645, an increase of \$22,300 over last year.

Jeon Baptiste Labelle, for 42 years a resident of St. John's, N. B., died in Montreal, died suddenly Friday morning. He was 72 years of age.

Mrs. Catharine Woodfine, aged 40, committed suicide at Montreal by taking carbolic acid. She had been suffering for weeks from neuritis and the pain is supposed to have unbalanced her mind.

Joseph Edwards, a young man, was drowned at Kaminitiquia, Port William. He was employed on bridge construction, and fell into the river. He was 26 years old, a native of Pembroke, Ont., and unmarried.
