When will Germany strike She struck at Verdun in late February. But she was compelled to strike in an unfavorble time for campaigning, because oth Britain and Russia were preparooth Britain and Russia were preparing to strike in the late spring, and it was essential to dispose of France before either of her other great foes was ready. But all through the Verdun operations, from February to April, Germany was handicapped by weather. Her offensive was slowed down at times by the weather conditions on times by the weather conditions on the Meuse hills. This was not a de-cisive factor in her defeat, but it had a limited importance.

And, with the exception of the Ver-And, with the exception of the Verdun operation, we have had no great winter campaign in the west. The battle of Ypres ended in the middle of November; all operations until the last days of April, 1915, were minor and local. The campaign of 1915 ended in October with the close of the battles of Loos and Champagne. The campaign of 1916 ended with the British victory at Beaumont-Hamel, an incident in the greater battle of the Somme in November. Petain delivered two successful blows at Verdun in October and with limited objectives. Last year the campaign disappeared under a flood in Flanders and with the taking of Passchendaed early in November.
