Interesting and appealing letters accompany the rush of Advertiser coal coupons to this office. One of those received today is one which not only makes some interesting points, but drives home the contention of numerous people that the city should see that there is an equitable distribution of the available fuel supply. This letter, written by a Piccadilly street woman, is interesting:

"I have filled in accompanying blank according to request, and trust some means will be devised whereby our coal necessities will be met this year.

"We, among hundreds of others, suffered severely last winter. Our dealer promised to see us through, with the result that our supply was limited to five tons in a 14-room house. Naturally we barely escaped freezing to death. I have had my order for this winter's coal in since May, but have received none yet, and am told as the April orders are not filled yet I may not be able to get any.

"Would it not be fairer for the dealers to supply each customer with a small amount than to leave some poor unfortunate without any? Some homes have their full quota—and more. Others have been supplied until Christmas—and we hear of some cases where celand we hea

"No doubt it is owing to the unfair distribution that we hear of some families who will suffer untold privations this winter. tions this winter.

"I move to a new house on October 1, without a scrap of furnace coal, and illness in my family.

"If the coal situation could possibly be relieved a little it would lessen much

be relieved a little it would lessen much suffering."

Soldier's Wife Suffered.

"I do hope I will be able to get coal better than I did last winter," writes a mother of five children, whose husband has been in France three years and four months. Day after day last winter she, with one of her children, lugged home a bag of coal that they might keep the others warm. Many days she returned with the bag empty. "My husband is a man 74 years of age, and not able to work all the time," writes an aged woman. "I am a 33rd Battalion veteran, and lost one of my arms. I have a wife who is far from strong, and an infant babe," writes a soldier. Both are without coal.

These appeals are only a few of those received. The Advertiser has 244 such appeals to date. Over 80 per cent of them are from people without a pound of coal in their cellars.

LONDON SOLDIER Rev. W. M. Walker Tenders His Resignation.

Rev. W. M. Walker, pastor of the Wortley Road Baptist Church, the minister of longest standing continuously in one charge in the city, tendered his resignation at the evening service on Sunday. Mr. Walker came to London 27 years ago from Barrie, where he had been pastor for nearly five years after Sunday. Quiet, unassuming, and reticent, Mr. Walker's choice has always been to keep his own personality in the background. By brother ministers, he has been beloved and esteemed for his high idealism, his scholarliness and his deep spirituality. In leaving the Wortley Road Church, an exceptionally close tie is being broken between a pastor and his people. He has been with his congregation so long that he has become a part of the members' lives. PTE. R. E. STEWART, son of R. B. Stewart of Elmwood avenue, has been admitted to Gironde Hospital, France, suffering from pneumonia, according to official word received by his father on Sunday. Pte. Stewart enlisted with the 135th Battalion when only 16 years of age, appearing older because of his excellent physique. When overseas, he was transefrred to a forestry battalion, with which he has served up to the time of his illness.


