War trophies from Ottawa and other Canadian points have arrived in Lon-don for the Army and Navy Veterans' Association exhibit at the Western Fair. Along with the many interesting rophies the association has secured the celebrated painting, "The Canadians at St. Julien." The picture is nine by seventeen feet, and is a most realistic piece of work. It gives an intimate touch on the side of the great war of which little is known in Canada.

The trench shown in the picture was held by French and Canadian troops who were driven back when the Gerwho were driven back when the Germans put over their first gas attack in the second battle of Ypres on April 21, 1915. The picture was printed from the description of a returned soldier, and two returned soldiers who were in the battle posed for the artist throughout the painting. In the picture the Canadlans, with set faces and bayonets drawn, are seen charging the trench which is filled with the Germans' finest regiment, the Prussian Guards. The Canadians had been fighting for four Canadians had been fighting for four days on one day's rations. About 2,000 men went into the battle, but only about 500 returned.
