# REGARDING STREET KAILWAY

Believes People Should Have Opportunity To Vote On Every Plan of Possible Settlement.

Full explanation of his attitude on the street railway question was made by Mayor Little in a statement issued today. He takes up the whole situation in detail and gives a clear statement of the various alternatives open to the council and the citizens. He points to that he is only too willing to carry out the will of the people, but that he believes they should be allowed to vote on all the possible plans of settlement, and that they should not be forced into a position where their only means getting the cars operated will be to into a position where their only means

"In the first place, there is no desire on my part to increase the fares for the benefit of the London Street Railway Company. At the same time, we must admit that the city is in a very serious situation, and transportation must be provided.

"Under bylaw No. 916, the only redress we have is the cancellation of the franchise. Were that done, the company would either be compelled to take its tracks, etc., off the streets or the city would have to take over the systematics. MANY ARE OPPOSED

Compromise Plan Is To Be Adopted As a Final Resort.

Chicago, June 12.—Senator Harding of Ohio emerged today from all-night conferences of Republican chieftains as the man expected to break the imminent deadlock on the presidential nomination. On him they plan to concentrate their strength should the convention fail to break through the blockade established yesterday by four ballots. blockade established yesterday by four ballots.

Senator Harding participated in the conference. He also saw Senator Johnson in the latter's private apartment, but the California senator described the visit as a "convention call." It gained significance because backers of the Harding movement are looking to Johnson supporters for aid if their plans materialize.

The tentative plan of originators of the new Harding boom was contingent upon failure of early votes today to result in nomination of Wood, Low, den or Johnson.

Originators of the Harding compromise plan were known to be seeking support of the California senator's adherents if it became clear that Johnson could not be nominated. The possibility of nominatings Johnson for vice-president is being canvassed.

Opponents of the Harding plan declared they would fight it to a finish in a caucus of the New York delegation today. Gen, Wood was informed of the new move.
