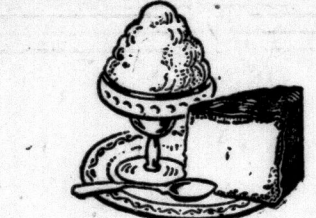

Mayonnaise



3 tablespoons Borden's Evaporated
Milk, undiluted; 1/4 teaspoonful salt;
1/2 teaspoonful pepper; 1/2 teaspoonful
mustard; 2 tablespoons sharp vine-
gar; 3/4 cupful salad oil—any kind.
Combine the seasonings, add the milk,
and gradually beat in the oil with an
egg beater. Then whip in the vinegar.
Use as you may. Transfers to
covered jar, keeps well in a cool place.

Orange Cream Sherbet

over top. Bake in moderate oven.

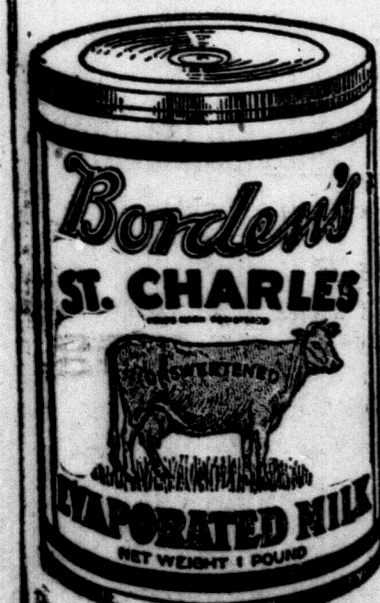

BOOKS OF BELL TELEPHONE CO.'Y TO BE EXAMINED

N. M. Lash Says Greatest
Items of Cost Long Dis-
tance Calls.

TALK 3,000 MILES

First Part of Inquiry Expected
To Be Finished
Today.

OTTAWA, Sept. 22.—(Canadian Press)—
Hearing of the Bell Telephone Com-
pany's application for an increase in
rates was not concluded by the board
of railway commissioners today. When
adjournment was taken, shortly after 5
o'clock, the company still had one wit-
ness to produce in order to complete
the establishment of its case. It is
probable that the taking of evidence
will be concluded by noon tomorrow.
The next sitting will not take place until
early in November, because Chief Com-
missioner Carvell leaves on Saturday
for the West, and he will not conclude
western sittings for the board before
the end of October. Meanwhile, ac-
countants are to examine books of the
company and produce all the statistical
statements that have been demanded by
opposing counsel.

Long-Distance Calls.
The chief witness called today by the
company was N. M. Lash, chief en-
gineer, who was called to demonstrate
the greater items of costs in conducting
a large telephone system other than in-
creased cost of wages and materials.
He dwelt particularly upon the in-
creased complexity of the business and
the ever-growing intricacies of long-
distance telephony. He said that in
the past the public had been satisfied
to talk 300 or 400 miles. Now 2,000 or
3,000 miles was not unusual, and plants
had to be able to take care of almost
any distance. The cost of such tele-
phony was very great.

Repeating to questions by the chief
commissioner, Mr. Lash said he was
reasonably certain that \$10,000,000
were required annually for the company
the next two or three years, to meet
the demands of the public.
This figure he put at an absolute
minimum. He stated that it would
take two years to install automatic tele-
phones in any new exchange, and that
it would be utterly impossible to think
of substituting a complete system of
automatic in Toronto or Montreal ex-
cepting at great cost.

BRITISH SUPREMACY ON SEAS NOT GOOD AS IT MIGHT BE

E. P. Fredericks Advocates
Building of More Ships
by Dominions.

TORONTO, Sept. 22.—In an effort to
complete the business of the ninth
congress of chambers of commerce of
the British Empire today, sixteen res-
olutions were discussed and carried, but
the business before tomorrow. The
resolutions dealt with the short-
comings of the Empire and embraced mat-
ters of importance to the nations,
matters relating to the Empire, and
matters of a sectional nature.

Controversial Subject.
The most controversial subject that
has yet come before the congress was
a proposal by J. Hodgson of Sheffield,
England, that all business arising out
of the proposed federation of the
chambers of commerce of the Empire
should be controlled by the imperial council of com-
merce. There was strong opposition
to this, and finally a modification of
the resolution was carried.

A number of the delegates took the
ground that the effect of such a resolu-
tion as that moved by Mr. Hodgson
would be to create a bureaucracy in
London, and in the modification of
the original resolution this feature
was removed.

The congress approved of all the
chambers of commerce and boards of
trade throughout the Empire, and
affiliated with the British imperial
council of commerce.

TORONTO, Sept. 22.—Steps were
taken this morning to found a federal
chamber of commerce in Canada, when
a resolution, introduced by Charles Mar-
riott of Toronto was adopted by the
congress of Imperial Chambers of Com-
merce at today's session favoring the
project. A committee was appointed to
act in the matter, consisting of Lord
Harris, Lieut.-Col. Ponton, Col. Cock-
burn, H. Evans, W. T. Christie and Mr.
Marriott, Ontario, and Sir James Wood
seconded.

International C. of C.
The congress also endorsed a resolu-
tion advocating admittance of colonial
boards of trade and chambers of com-
merce to the international chamber of
commerce. Dr. A. T. Hobson, divi-
sioner, thought that the League of Na-
tions would agree to the formation of
such an international chamber of com-
merce, as some such organization was
provided for in the league's constitu-
tion. However, he advocated that the
proposed chamber be divorced from the
league in its organization and opera-
tion.

Mark Sheldon, Sydney, N. S. W., in-
troduced a resolution for stricter ob-
servance of the rules in the various
Empire. The resolution was endorsed as
affecting correspondence.
