The pinch hitters' craze, which has afflicted baseball managers appear to have become afflicted, has a strong opponent in S. B. Johnson, president of the American League, according to a statement made public by him. He declared that he favored baseball legislation to curb the pinch-hitter habit. ENGINE OF MODERN TYPE HAS BIG POSSIBILITIES

A rotary steam engine which may work great changes in the design of steam prime movers because of its simplicity, compactness and power, is now being brought out in the States and in Canada. In principle it bears some resemblance to the steam turbine. The steam enters the centre of the engine through a stationary sleeve about which revolves a central rotating member or shaft, to which two pistons are attached. The steam on passing through a port in one of these pistons enters the three steam chambers that surround the shaft; its expansion causes the shaft to revolve. As it turns the pistons successively come in contact with three conical cylinder heads which revolve on their axes and by reason of a pocket in the side of each allow the pistons to pass. This revolving of the shaft and pistons likewise serves to open ports which permit the cylinders to exhaust. The engine can be reversed at any speed without air or shock, since the inertia of the shaft and pistons cushioned against the pressure at the boiler.

FRENCH HOLD FAST TO U.S. SECURITIES

Willing to Lend Them to Government, But Not to Sell Them.

LOAN TERMS LIBERAL

American List Includes All Gilt-Edged Bonds Held in France.

PARIS.—The French Government's borrowing operation in foreign securities is taking on important proportions in the American as in the other foreign list. One institution alone has already secured \$20,000,000 in American (\$2,400,000) in American, and it is possible that the final total will run to a handsome figure. Bankers here feel that the French holder of American securities could not now be induced to sell in large proportions, for the most vehement efforts to drive him into the market have not resulted in a liquidation of more than a fifth, and perhaps less, of the total held in the country. The reasons for this reticence are too obvious to require explanation—fear of a long European crisis immediately after the war, the relatively high degree of certainty in American as compared with European prosperity for the next ten years, exchange advantages, the widespread habit of scattering family fortunes in various fields in anticipation of wars and the ways of bad times, etc. The loaning of securities is another matter, however. No one can accuse the French investor of lack of patriotism; he was patriotic enough to sell some of his American securities even when he thought it was pure folly to do so; now that he has the chance of loaning them on good terms he is ready to come forward. The government's terms are excellent. The theory is that the lender shall receive his interest or dividends plus 25 per cent, interest included, plus whatever advantage there may be in the exchange. The loan is for three years, with a right to renewals by the state, probably two, in case of force majeure. Because it is not practicable for the state to borrow against its securities unless they are readily marketed it is specified that the state shall have the right to take over itself the loaned paper at prices which are arbitrarily fixed by the minister of finance, or, if the lender prefers, at the highest market price achieved during the three months preceding the date of purchase by the state from him, which in some cases might be a better bargain than the arbitrarily fixed ministerial prices. It is understood, too, that this matter of purchase by the state is purely formal, to reassure the bankers with whom it will deposit the securities against loans to assist exchange. The posted American list includes all the gilt edged bonds held in France except a few which had been previously bought up by the big French credit institutions for the state. Central Pacific notably. The list of shares is relatively shorter, exception being taken to anything but the very best securities, which are more or less readily marketable in France, either thru existence on the bourse list or thru widespread good standing among investors. The negotiations between the ministry of finance and the bankers representing or advising for the American interest are not quite completed, however, and it is possible that there may be some changes in the list and in the terms before the lending process is started. The Credit Lyonnais, for example, is not yet taking on the American offerings on account of possible changes in the terms. It is naturally impossible to guess accurately as to whether the loan will run to so large a figure as a billion francs. First, because we do not know precisely how much paper there is to draw from, and secondly, because we cannot anticipate the public's real sentiment as regards how far it will pay to go in the matter. 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On Fish Day
