OTTAWA EXPECTANT OF WELL SESSION, RUMORS NUMEROUS

Crucial Vote Is Not Likely, However, to Come Before March First. RECONSTRUCTION TALK

Ottawa, Ont., Feb. 13.—Like a cork upon troubled waters, Ottawa floats tonight upon a sea of rumors. Unofficial Ottawa news is so much perturbed. The resident population evinced more interest in the ice races on the river, than in the political situation, but members of parliament and the newspaper correspondents were all busy discussing rumors of cabinet changes, the fate of the session and the possibility of an early election.

Looting by Wholesale Of Prussian Railways

DEADLY POISON GIVEN WOMAN BY DRUGGIST DR. POLLOCK ASSERTS

Prediction by Seer Prompted This Murder

Boston, Feb. 13.—Acting on the prediction of a fortune teller that Antonio Carbonello would do him bodily harm within 24 hours, Francesco Bono is alleged to have shot and killed Carbonello last night as the latter was reading in the kitchen of his north end home. Bono, who was held on a charge of murder, ran from the house into the arms of two patrolmen, who took him to the station, where the shooting had already been reported. Bono told the police he had come here from Syracuse, N. Y.

Medicine Was Prescribed for Mrs. Ethel Ruznik Preparatory to X-ray Examination, But Barium Sulphurite Was Given Instead of Barium Sulphate, Causing Her Death in Short Time.

"Mrs. Ethel Ruznik was suffering from chronic inflammation of the appendix and died as the result of taking deadly poison."

This was a statement made to The World last night by Dr. M. A. Pollock, 249 Beverley street, who prescribed medicine preparatory to an X-ray examination which he was to have made on Sunday afternoon, following the diagnosis on Saturday night of the condition of Ethel Ruznik, 291 Augusta avenue, who died a few hours after taking the medicine on Sunday morning.

Mill Fires in England Due to Irish Agitators

Manchester, England, Feb. 13.—A number of simultaneous outbreaks of fire in several mills and factories in Manchester, Fallowfield, Rayton and Rochdale on Saturday night were accompanied by riotous and destructive acts, such as the employment of inflammable liquids and the firing of men acting suspiciously, some of whom were responsible for dealing with great dominant questions and decisions which affected the common fortunes of the whole body.

TO TREAT CANCER WITH NEW X-RAYS OF HIGHEST POWER

Discovery by Harvard Savant of Rays of Greater Penetration. WILL MAKE THORO TEST

Cambridge, Mass., Feb. 13.—Discoveries made by William Duane, professor of bio-physics at Harvard, working in collaboration with research students of physics, have made it possible, according to Harvard physicists, to secure X-rays of more penetrating quality than have ever before been obtained in the United States, and that these new rays are now to be used for the first time on this continent for the alleviation of cancer.

RECEIVES MESSAGE FROM SPECIAL ENVOY THAT HE HAS JOINED NATIONALISTS

Constantinople, Feb. 13.—The sultan has received a telegram from Izzet Pasha, who was sent to Ankara in December by the sultan to entreat him to negotiate an agreement with the Turkish Nationalists in which Izzet said he had joined the Nationalists. "All are deserting me," exclaimed the sultan, tearing up the telegram.

DISABLED STEAMER NEARING LOUISBURG

Bristol City Now Within Sixty-One Miles of Coast—Burns Fittings to Keep Steam.

DEATHS IN NEW YORK FROM SLEEPING SICKNESS

New York, Feb. 13.—Five more deaths from sleeping sickness occurred here and in the vicinity today. In Port Chester, a suburb, where one of the deaths occurred, public funeral services after death from the disease have been forbidden by Dr. Wm. J. Sheehan, health officer. In each case the victim was taken to a hospital suffering from some other disease, usually pneumonia or influenza, which developed into sleeping sickness. No new cases were reported today.

MOTHER AND DAUGHTER DIE IN BURNING HOME

Newcastle, N. B., Feb. 13.—Mrs. Ernest Gardner and her 14-year-old daughter lost their lives in the flames of their burning home at Grand Down, about 25 miles from Newcastle. Mrs. Gardner had made a frantic effort to save her daughter and had entered the burning house when the structure fell, burying both mother and daughter.

TERRIER AND SPANIEL FAITHFUL UNTIL DEATH

Vancouver, B.C., Feb. 13.—James Moffat, 39, Jonghoremsa was burned to death in a fire at his home this morning. His charred body was found lying on the bed by a friend, who went to visit him. On the floor were found the suffocated bodies of a terrier and a spaniel, their heads pointing to their master.

ALLEGED MURDERER PRESENT AT INQUEST

Brookville, Feb. 13.—Derrick Tennant, aged 79, who is alleged to have shot and killed Robert Wood, the husband of his niece, last Monday, was present at the inquest yesterday afternoon, but after the hearing was returned to the hospital. He is said to be a model prisoner, but is under constant guard. No new evidence was adduced at the inquest which was adjourned until February 22, to permit Wood's widow to give testimony. She is under medical care as the result of the injuries which she sustained when she jumped from the window of her house to escape the alleged murderer.

SEVENTY MOUNTED POLICE DESPATCHED TO THOROLD

Ottawa, Feb. 13.—To assist in preventing further trouble in connection with a strike situation in Thorold, Ont., seventy members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, under command of Inspectors Cudde and Fraser were despatched to that place Saturday night.

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AMERICAN COMMITTEE WASTED THAT REPUBLICAN ARMY MUST NOT PARTICIPATE

Dublin, Feb. 13.—Whether the American committee for relief in Ireland, which recently arrived, will be permitted to execute its plans, depends upon a joint conference of the civil and military authorities, which will be held at an early date to decide this question. Chairman France and other members of the committee, with the United States consul, visited Dublin Tuesday, and had a long interview with Sir John Anderson, the under-secretary, and General Macready, both of whom displayed interest in the intentions of the committee, but opposed the idea of the distribution of money and supplies. The prime object of the committee is to aid in reconstruction.

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
