London, Feb 13.-Addressing an English-speaking union farewell Lord Reading, the new viceroy India, Winston Spencer Churchill, the new secretary of state for the colonies, on Saturday said that so far as the dominions and the British Emdre were concerned, the new principle developing was the common conatation among members of the British Empire regarding difficulties of any one of them. No decision concerning the status of one nation of the empire could be taken in a final way without consultation between the whole body of the empire. ### Looting by Wholesale Of Prussian Railways

Berlin, Fet. 13.—The number of thefts committed on the Prussian State Railways during 1920 reached a total of 288,975. Loaded freight cars which vanished in transit exceeded 17,500, while more than 124,000 freight consignmore than 124,000 freight consignments were stolen en route. Experses parcels to the number of 89,000, and pieces of hand luggage to the number of 7,800 were also officially reported missing.

Railway detectives succeeded in apprehending 15,000 of the thieves who were captured. Of these one-half the number were railway employes. The number of railway officials and minor employes discharged in the past year because of theft, bribery and other crooked practices reached a total of 5,778.
