

A Disastrous Blaze at Wallaceburg

Wallaceburg, July 4.—A serious fire occurred here today evening, at least \$12,000 damage being done before it was brought under control. The fire started in the rear of Armstrong's flour and feed shop, and is believed to be of incendiary origin.

George Taylor's and Peter Forbes' groceries both had a close call. Armstrong & Co. have an insurance of \$2,800, and Charles Davis agent for Frost & Wood, is partially insured. The buildings destroyed belonged to Harry and Wilford Martin, and are covered by insurance.

The Paraguayan Rebels Victorious

Buenos Ayres, July 5.—Advices received here today stated that the revolutionists have been victorious in Paraguay and a new Government has been established. These advices have been confirmed by a dispatch received by the minister of foreign affairs from the Argentine legation at Asuncion, officially notifying the minister that the revolutionary party had succeeded in overthrowing the Paraguayan Government, and that several

of the Paraguayan ministers of state had taken refuge in the legation. The revolutionists have appointed Dr. Emiliano Gonzalez Naveiro president. He held the office of vice-president in the Government which had just been ousted. Fighting has been proceeding in the streets of Asuncion for some days past and many of the public buildings have been seriously damaged. Previous estimates of the killed and wounded, however, have been exaggerated, and it is now believed that the number will not exceed 500.

HINT TRIPLE LIFE IS MURDER CLEW

Police Say Mrs. F. Thompson's Sweetheart, Spouse and J. H. Raymond Are One.

Chicago, July 5.—The merger of three identities into one—that of Nelson, the sweetheart chauffeur; Edward Thompson, the school teacher husband, and J. H. Raymond, the man who took the woman to the rooming-house at 1242 Michigan avenue—may solve the murder of Mrs. Francis Thompson, formerly of Toronto, according to the police. Both Inspector John Wheeler and Walter C. Gilmore, the brother of the strangled victim, believe the husband, Edward Thompson, has been living a triple life, and with his arrested mystery which so far has surrounded the case will be explained, and that it will be shown that both "Nelson" and "Raymond" are Thompson, the husband, whom the woman was said to have deserted six months after the marriage. Assistant Chief Schuetzler withdrew from the personal management of the investigation yesterday and Inspector Wheeler, in whose district the crime was committed, sent telegrams to the police of St. Paul, Minneapolis, Fargo, N. D., Crookston, Minn., and New York, in which cities Thompson has lived, asking his immediate arrest if found.

Murder Chooses Another Crime. The assistant chief's theory that Mrs. Thompson was murdered for her diamonds was discarded by the police during the day when further investigation proved that the woman did not have the large number of jewels that at first had been believed. Through information given by Gilmore, the police have come to believe that Mrs. Thompson was murdered, not for her property, but in order to prevent her from disclosing information regarding a certain crime of which she is said to have had knowledge. Harry Morton, who pretended to be the husband of Alice Hamilton, the housekeeper in the "house of mystery," was found in the Bridewell in the morning. He had been sentenced Tuesday by Municipal Judge Fiske to 60 days imprisonment for the passing of a bogus check on Samuel Cohen. He as well as Alice Hamilton, who still is held at the Harrison street annex, asserted they knew nothing of the crime.

Brother Says Three Are One. Gilmore has expressed his determination to run down the murderer of his sister and in his tour of investigation visited the house on Michigan avenue. Interviewed the roomers of the place and told Mrs. Mary Verbrugge he was convinced the husband, Thompson, was "J. H. Raymond," who was seen with Thompson a number of times in Oak Park. His contention was borne out by the descriptions furnished by the police of the three men. The following description sent out by the police answers for the three: Age—Thirty to thirty-five. Height—Five feet seven inches. Weight—One hundred and forty-five pounds. Complexion—Dark. Nose—Prominent. Wore a dark suit and brown stiff hat; also a one-carat oblong-cut diamond earring. To add to the mystery, Lieut. Cadmore of the central detective bureau received a communication from a saloonkeeper, whose name he refused to divulge, that a man answering the description and giving the name, Frank H. Raymond, recently attempted to dispose of several diamonds. Cadmore sent out a bulletin to all police stations calling for the arrest of this man on a charge of murder.

Hints of Mysterious Crime. But through Gilmore's conversation with Mrs. Verbrugge, the landlady, who found the dead body, and Mrs. Anna Wallace, a roomer in the house, the police received the clew which they believe will solve the mystery. This conversation was verified later by Inspector Wheeler. "My sister was married to this man 'Thompson,'" said Gilmore, "and they lived together for six months and apparently were happy. Thompson was a Norwegian. Then she suddenly left him, declaring he was a 'dope fiend,' and hinted at some mysterious affair with which he was connected. At the time I paid little attention to her assertion. At another time she told me her husband during their last few days together had often come into the house in which they were living with his hands covered with blood and hinted at having committed some desperate offence and saying she might suffer in some mysterious manner."

Murderer Feared Exposure? "What do you believe about your sister going to the rooming-house with

this man Raymond?" asked Mrs. Wallace. "I think Thompson, fearing to be exposed in some manner by my sister, followed her around the country, even to Oak Park, where he was known as Nelson, and finally found her in Chicago. Fearing for her life, she probably went to the room with him when he insisted upon it."

"Whom do you accuse of the murder?" he was asked. "I won't accuse anybody now," he replied, "but I am confident the mystery will be solved within a few days. 'I feel convinced,'" said Inspector Wheeler, "that Nelson and Raymond are Thompson, and when he is caught the case will be solved. The descriptions of the three tally and it seems to me the most plausible theory is that Mrs. Thompson went to this rooming-house with her husband under compulsion." Detective Sergeants Duffy and Howe, who were sent to Oak Park by Inspector Wheeler, learned that two weeks ago Mrs. Thompson had inquired of the Chicago and Northwestern ticket agent at Oak Park whether a ticket to Crookston, Minn., had been left there for her. Crookston is said to be the place where her husband recently had been living. Mrs. Edward Johnson, Lake street and Harlem avenue, told the detective she had seen Mrs. Thompson with the chauffeur Nelson in Oak Park about ten days ago and she also knew of the woman having a sister living at 204 East at least, Milwaukee. Another clew was discovered in the attempted identifications through laundry marks of the two handkerchiefs forced into the woman's throat. These bore the marks "2438" and "P. 143." On one of the handkerchiefs was a large embroidered letter "B."

BRUTALLY ASSAULTED BY UNKNOWN MAN St. Thomas, July 5.—Ten-year-old Mabel Welch, the little daughter of a farmer near here, was subjected to a brutal assault yesterday by an unknown man, who has not yet been caught. She was crossing a railway culvert on the way home, when a man sprang upon her, and it was only after a most desperate struggle that she succeeded in escaping. She managed to reach a nearby house, where she fainted, and is now in a precarious condition. A large number of men are scouring the country for the miscreant.

WINNIPEG AND THE FOURTH Citizens Object to American Methods as to National Holidays.

Winnipeg, July 4.—A good deal of ill-feeling has developed over the celebration of the fourth. A protest is being made in the press against the action of the manager of the C. P. R. Hotel, the Royal Alexandra, in profusely decorating with American bunting when no attempt was made to decorate on Dominion Day. He explains that he is an American and is after American patronage. "This hotel does not celebrate Dominion Day," he added. It is reported also that a prominent American industrial concern here refused to give its employees a holiday on Dominion Day and that the works closed down today instead.

BONILA ON WARPATH About To Lead a Revolutionary Movement Against Honduran Government.

Washington, July 4.—Information has reached the state department of a proposed revolutionary movement against the Government of Honduras under the leadership of Former President Bonilla. No details are given. The Governments of Salvador and Guatemala have given directions to prevent any movement of that character taking form in those countries. Minister Gage, of Honduras, at the direction of his Government, talked to Toronto Globe. The funeral of Clement Irwin, who was drowned in the Thames near Woodland on Wednesday afternoon, will take place this afternoon from St. George's street, Toronto, to St. Basil's Church, and thence to Mount Hope Cemetery. His brother, the only relative at present in the city, his parents being in Barbadoes brought back the body yesterday morning.

SAY IT'S BRYAN ON FIRST BALLOT

His Supporters Not Alarmed By Renewed Activity of Allies at Denver.

Denver, July 5.—The convention throngs have been pouring into the city by every train today, it has been a boisterous Sunday, with bands, cheering, and delegations through the streets, with steadily swelling crowds in the hotel lobbies, and with leaders and delegations holding private conferences on candidates and measures.

Most of the leaders and more than half of the delegates are here, and the tide of humanity which comes to look on and cheer is now in full movement toward the city. Tonight the crowds are turning to the splendid auditorium where the convention will be held. The vast amphitheater is lighted and open to the public for the first time for a ball concert, and the scene within the enclosure, hung with flags and packed to its full capacity, suggests the throngs which will soon get there for the convention. While these outward evidences of activity have been going on, the leaders who are shaping the party's coming gatherings have been holding frequent meetings in upper chambers of hotels, arranging their final plans. The chief event of the day has been the movement of the "Allies" to galvanize the opposition to Bryan to something like a definite and formidable movement.

The Bryan managers have at no time shown nervousness over the renewed activities of the "Allies," and today Mayor Dahlman of Omaha, one of the Bryan chiefs, made this very definite statement, showing the expectations of the Bryan forces: "Mr. Bryan will be nominated on the first ballot." "The Bryan forces now control 36 delegations and will have at least that many members of the committee on resolutions, and probably more. The platform adopted will be in connection with Mr. Bryan's personal views, and will express his well-known ideas on all of the important political issues. The vice-presidential question may be described as being in the air. If the men who call themselves the old guard can unite on a strong Democrat, the Bryan men will not show curiosity as to the attitude of their candidate toward Mr. Bryan in 1896 and 1900. If the eastern Democrats fail to get together, the managers will make a selection from a number of available candidates, any one of whom would be satisfactory to Mr. Bryan."

turned, the coverings were torn from the bed and scattered around the room; a towel had been forced into the woman's mouth and then her head wrapped in a sheet, and her body was covered with bruises and scratches.

Buys Jewels; Robbery Motive? Robbery was the motive for the crime, according to the police. Mrs. Thompson was known to have possessed a considerable amount of jewelry, principally diamonds. These are missing from the house. Recently she had made valuable purchases of jewels at Marshall Field & Company's and the C. D. Peacock Company. Sale checks for these purchases were found in her room.

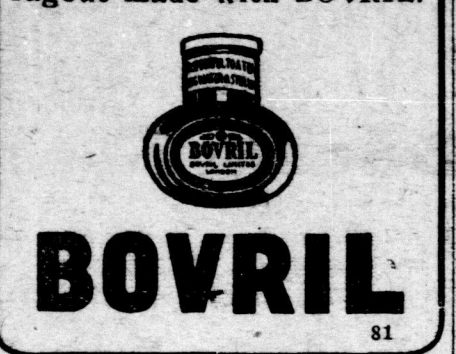
According to Mrs. Verbrugge, a man, who gave his name as J. H. Raymond, brought the woman to the house over a week ago, and introduced her as his wife. He has not been seen since Saturday, when he went to the room with Mrs. Thompson.

The Suspects. Besides Thompson, the police also looked for Mrs. Mary Morton, the housekeeper at the Michigan avenue house, and her husband, who has been employed as a solicitor by a downtown office. The police had been missing for two days, but the woman was found late in the evening at the home of her mother, Sangamon and West Harrison streets. Her real name, she said, was Alice Hamilton. She denied all knowledge of the murder, but was held at the Harrison street station annex. Morton left Monday morning, the woman said. "I stayed until Tuesday," she claimed, then, as I had no money and was nearly starving, I went to my mother, after reporting to the Harrison street station that my husband was missing. I did not know of the murder until tonight. Sunday and Monday I tried to open the door of the room where that woman was, but it was locked and I could not arouse anyone. I don't know whether Morton knew anything about the murder or why he left."

Brother Identifies Body. Mrs. Thompson was identified at Rolston's morgue by her brother, Walter Gilmore, 294 Wilcox avenue, who is a sub-foreman of the Western Union Telegraph Company. Gilmore has been employed by the telephone company nearly 20 years. He and his wife were taken to the morgue by the police after newspapermen had located them in their home near Austin. "Yes, it is Fanny," cried Gilmore as he viewed the body of the murdered woman. "Oh, to think it should have come to this."

Gilmore and his wife sobbed as they were led from the undertaking establishment and hurried to the city hall in an automobile. An effort was made to keep the identification secret. The murdered woman's maiden name was Fanny Gilmore, and she lived in London, Canada. In New York she married a school teacher named Edward Thompson, afterward going with him to Fargo, N. D., then to Minneapolis, Minn., and finally to St. Paul. The couple separated about a year ago, and the woman came to Chicago, living in a house on Washington avenue.

East avenue, and for a week at the house of Mrs. O. C. Mann, 138 Clinton street, and for a short time by Mrs. A. H. Vilas, 315 Forest avenue, Oak Park. Says She Loved Chauffeur. Mrs. Ed Johnson, an acquaintance of Harry Grawberg, a salesman in a street and Harlem avenue, said Mrs. Thompson had a child living with her sister-in-law and also had a sister who was an actress in New York. She claimed Mrs. Thompson had been keeping company with a chauffeur named Nelson and recently had gone with Mr. Johnson to see an attorney about securing a divorce. "Yes, she always had a number of diamonds," said Mrs. Johnson. "She never wore them, but kept them in a chamois bag. If these jewels are gone it is certain robbery was the motive for the murder."

Gilmore said he could not understand what led the woman to go to the house with 'Raymond' and quit her employment as a cloak model. But little of the woman wearing apparel was found in the room, and it was of poorer quality than she was in the habit of using. No One Heard the Struggle. Another condition which mystifies the police is that while it is conceded a noisy struggle must have taken place between the woman and stranger to death, and most of the rooms in the house are usually occupied, no one can be found who heard any unusual disturbance. Grawberg, a salesman in a downtown department store, who has the room adjoining that in which Mrs. Thompson was found, told the police he never had heard the slightest disturbance in the house. "The door could not have been committed at night or I would have been awakened," said Grawberg. "It must have occurred Sunday afternoon while I was away." The condition of the body carries out this belief. During his attempt to learn who Raymond is, Inspector Wheeler learned that a man named John H. Rainer, alias J. H. Raymond, was wanted in South Chicago on the charge of abandonment. His brother William said he was living on Michigan avenue somewhere near the scene of the murder. For a time it was believed the stranger woman was his wife, but this theory fell through when William Rainer visited the morgue.

Mrs. Verbrugge's Story. Mrs. Verbrugge informed the police neither Mr. nor Mrs. Morton told her of their intention to leave the house. "I hired her through an advertisement," she said. "When I discovered she had gone, taking with her two trunks and several pieces of furniture, which she had stored in the basement, my suspicions that something was wrong became aroused. I went through the house to see if anything belonging to me had been taken and found the body of Mrs. Thompson lying upon the floor. She was lying on her back, in a night-dress. I ran out and called the police."
