A PRACTICAL MAN TALKS ABOUT MOVING PICTURES

In conversation with a Times man, Edward Auger, Supt.-Mgr. Ombroscope Film Exchange, Montreal, the largest dealers in moving picture supplies in Canada, advanced some information regarding the popular nickel shows, that may be of interest.
With reference to the suggestion that a theatre be opened that would confine its programme to one class of pictures entirely, Mr. Auger states that under present conditions this would be impossible. The demand for subjects is so great that films are being produced in countless numbers, and yet it would not be possible to serve anything but a miscellaneous entertainment to patrons at the present time.
Mr. Auger is heartily in accord with the suggestion that a public censor be appointed; he does not believe that the picture theatres desire to run anything that is the least objectionable.
Mr. Auger is enthusiastic over the educational possibilities of moving pictures. His firm is in constant touch with film producers all over the world, and their policy is, to accept but the most desirable kind of subjects, but the time is not yet when a moving picture house can announce a particular class of pictures because of the diversity of subjects and the number of desirable films being issued each week.
Mr. Auger dislikes to have the word cheap applied to moving picture theatres. The performance being brief the price is equitable. A person may spend as much money in a three hour tour of the entertainment in this city as he would pay for a ticket to a dramatic performance. As to whether people get a nickel's worth of pleasure per theatre-going picture, he says that the growing number of picture houses throughout the United States and Canada and to the immense output of his company who are continually at their wits' end to keep up with the demand for animated photograph supplies.
