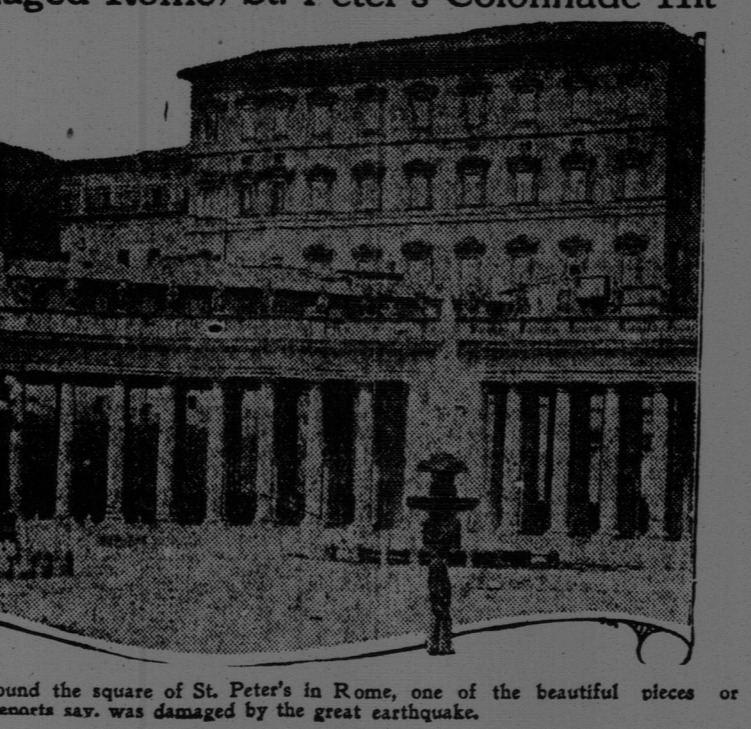
EXPIATORY SERVICE IS ANNOUNCED BY POPE

GERMANS FIGHT FIERCELY IN WESTERN THEATRE; BUT ALLIES HOLD THEM

In Two Places Enemy Recapture Portion of Trenches Previously Lost—Evidences of Severe Work—Austrians Make Stand in Carpathians

Paris, Jan. 22—The French War Office this afternoon gave out the following: "In Belgium the enemy yesterday bombarded Nieuport with a fair degree of violence. Our infantry made some slight progress to the east of the Lombaertzyde highway."

AUSTRIANS MAKE A STAND

London, Jan. 22—The Times Petrograd correspondent telegraphs that the Austrians appear, at last, to have realized the importance of the Russian advance through Bukovina, for they have assembled a large independent army, under Field Marshal Loedman, which has occupied the passes and posted heavy artillery, thus, to some extent, checking the rapid advance of the Russians.

GERMAN TORPEDO SINKS A BRITISH STEAMER

London, Jan. 22—The British steamer Durward, says a Rotterdam despatch to Reuters Telegram Company, has been torpedoed by a German submarine. The Durward was bound from Leith to Rotterdam and was struck by the torpedo while twenty-two miles off the coast of the Netherlands.

TOURIST ASSOCIATION TALKS OVER SITUATION WITH GRANT CUT OFF
