Anniversary Celebration of German Street Baptist

INTERESTING HISTORY

Baptist Minister Said to Have
Visited Here as Early as 1800
—The First Members—The
Pastors—Rev. Mr. Porter's
Successful Ministry

There was published in the year 1910 a history of German Street Baptist Church, St. John, N. B., for its first 100 years. This church is now, therefore 105 years old, and the celebration of its anniversary is an event of much interest. A minister of the Baptist Church is said to have visited St. John and Baptized converts as early as 1800, but the first church was organized on May 28, 1810, with twelve members, of whom nine were, Jeremiah Drake, Thomas Pettigrew, Nathan Garrison, John Harding, John M. Wilmet, William Stenning, Mrs. Thomas Harding, Mrs. Ulrich Hasfield and Mrs. Lovell, wife of Captain Lovell. The other three were probably from among the following named persons—Mrs. Harper, A. Magee, Amy Nixon, Captain William Harding and his wife.
Rev. A. Blakely was the first person baptized after the organization of the church. In 1812 there were twenty-seven members, but for the first three years the church was without a pastor. The first pastor, appointed in 1815, was Rev. Edmund Bole, a Frenchman, who came to Halifax in a French vessel that had been taken as a prize by the English. He remained pastor of the church in St. John for three years. The church met at first in a small room in Princess street, then in a small building in German street, between Duke and Queen streets, and in 1816, or 1817, years ago, they purchased the site at the corner of German and Queen streets, where a building was completed and dedicated in 1818. It fronted on Queen street and had a seating capacity of 500 to 600, and was lighted with candles. A brass chandelier suspended from the ceiling contained twenty-four candles. Candlesticks were also distributed all around the church, and the burning of some fifty of them had to be done about three times during service. Gas was introduced in the church in 1846. The church lasted fourteen hours. Explosions were heard throughout the night. Twenty-four soldiers were killed.
"On April 28 in a bombardment the Friedrichshafen hangars were damaged and a Zeppelin was destroyed. Bombs were also dropped at Leopoldshöhe and Lorch, and on the station at Haltingen. The history of the church is full of interest to Baptists, not only in St. John, but throughout the province. The book published in 1910 was compiled by the late T. D. Denham.
Since 1910 Rev. F. S. Porter has been pastor of the church, and almost immediately after he assumed that office there came an unprecedented period of expansion. The large new edifice fronting on German street, known as the German Street Institute, has been built, and also a mission building at East St. John, where excellent work has been done in that locality with its lately increased population. The membership of the church has greatly increased, and all departments of activity are in a most flourishing condition. The German Street Brotherhood organized in this church, has, during the last year, done a great deal of valuable work in matters relating to the welfare of the whole community.
Rev. Henry Alfred Porter, D. D., of Dallas, Texas, and brother of the pastor, will preach the anniversary sermon.

**SOLDIERS LIMITED
TO EVENING BEER**

New Ontario Regulations Forbid
Sale of Wines or Liquors and
Beer Only From 6 to 9 P. M.

Lindsay, May 8.—J. D. Flavelle, chairman of the License Commission of Ontario, called a meeting of the local hotel-keepers and their bartenders in the office of License Commissioner W. E. Thornbury. The object of the meeting was for the purpose of instructing the license holders how to carry out the new law, which it is the intention of the commission to enforce strictly.

The gist of the chairman's address was that no wine or liquors are in future to be served to any soldier, regardless of rank, at any time. Beer can be served out to them between the hours of six o'clock p. m. and nine o'clock p. m. Empty flasks are to be an unknown vessel around hotels in future, and, as it has always been understood, no bottles of liquor are to be sold in hotels.
A first offence or violation of the law which governs the liquor license act may mean the cancellation of the hotel keeper's license.
The commission wishes an observance of the law, not in a coercive way, but in strict adherence to what the act sets forth.

It would appear that violators will not get a second chance, as in the past, and the hotel men all seem bent on carrying out the law as set forth by the chairman.

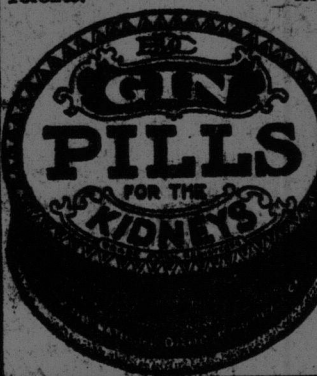

**ALLIES' AIRSHIPS IN
SUCCESSFUL RAID**

Zeppelins Destroyed, Soldiers Killed
and Long Trains Filled With
Benzol in German Lines Ruined

Paris, May 8.—An official note gives details of aerial raids by the allied aircraft, the information being obtained from the aviators themselves and from prisoners. The note says:

"On March 29 a bombardment of the railway station at Briey took place. Damage was done to Conflans, Briey and Metz where provision depots were destroyed and the railway was cut. The station at St. Quentin and a central depot of munitions were also destroyed. One hundred and fifty cars, many of them containing benzol, were completely destroyed and five which lasted fourteen hours. Explosions were heard throughout the night. Twenty-four soldiers were killed.

**BRITISH WIRELESS
STATION IN JAMAICA**

Powerful Plant Now Being Erected
on Blue Hills Near Kingston—
Might Have Saved Craddock's
Fleet

New York, May 8.—Great Britain is erecting a powerful wireless station on the Blue Hills near Kingston, Jamaica, according to the Rev. George B. Stalworthy, a Unitarian minister who has returned after a five months' visit to that island. He said officials on the island thought the new station, which was three hundred feet above the sea level, was intended to enable the Admiralty to send messages to the warships on the south Atlantic station.

Naval officers stationed at Kingston had informed him that if such a plant

had been in existence at the beginning of the war it would have prevented the defeat of Sir Christopher Craddock's fleet and enabled the warships on the coast to have picked up the Dresden and Karlsruhe before they sank so many vessels.

Jamaica is raising two squadrons of cavalry, composed of natives with English officers, to send to the front. The cavalry will be equipped and maintained by popular subscription on the island.

A battalion of infantry numbering 1,000 men, sailed for England with the Canadian troops, the minister asserted.

in the battalion to which I belong we have men who have taken up shooting as a hobby for years. These men have "sniped the sniper," and many a German sharpshooter has answered the call of a Canadian bull's-eye.

After my first experience in the German trenches I formed the opinion that the German snipers were well concealed in the rear of their trenches, from which points and at long range they did their deadly shooting. I am now, however, convinced that they are located in their front trenches, and fire from carefully made loop-holes such as I have described. Periscopes, while invaluable for general observations, are of little use in locating these loop-holes, as they can only be held up for a very short time before a bullet smashes the upper mirror. When an enemy loop-hole is successfully located it is only a matter of taking a chance through our own loop-holes before that particular locality is "more sniped than sniping."
