Brief Comments on Pastimes
of Interest to the
Fans.

Harry Black, proprietor of Black's Bowling Alleys, while in conversation with the writer recently put forth a suggestion, which is well worthy of adoption, namely that all of the alleys in the Maritime Provinces secure a uniform ball for candle pin rolling. This is badly needed for therein lies the secret of good rolling on one alley and poor shooting on another. Many participants in this sport attribute their poor showing on strange alleys to the condition of the alleys themselves, while the fault is usually with the ball. If any bowler is accustomed to a certain size and weight and is forced to use balls larger or smaller, lighter or heavier they are bound to have trouble. Because they become accustomed to a certain sized ball of standard weight on one alley they are able to roll consistently, but once forced to use a different ball they find they are not getting the breaks or they are shooting wide on singles. There is no doubt that the adoption of a standard size and weight ball by bowling alleys would be a popular move, and one which would greatly benefit the game. Bowling has become one of the leading pastimes in these parts and any move to improve the game will be welcomed.

A report was published giving details about an accident, which occurred recently in the Y. M. C. A. gymnasium in Portland, Me. It tells of some young men going there and after securing various cards starting in to do some stunts on the floor, one of which was a friendly wrestling match. It was while wrestling that one of the young men had his spine injured and his condition is still critical. This should be a warning to others. Wrestling is one of the greatest methods of developing muscles, but it is also one of the most dangerous. Unless a man is in condition he should not even wrestle in fun. There is grave danger of straining the heart ligaments as well as injuring the spine. Instructors in the art of wrestling usually make their pupils undergo a special course of training to strengthen the muscles of the wind and then gradually teach them the various holds. No real wrestling is allowed for a week or ten days. It is one of the most strenuous forms of sport and not all men or youths are physically fit to stand the strain on the muscles and heart.

He perseveres he should make good for he is a clever pitcher and a splendid hitter. Lack of condition was his undoing last season and his showing was only mediocre. No athlete with superior flesh can show at his best and with an inveterate salaried as well as a reputation is at stake it is well worth while keeping in condition. 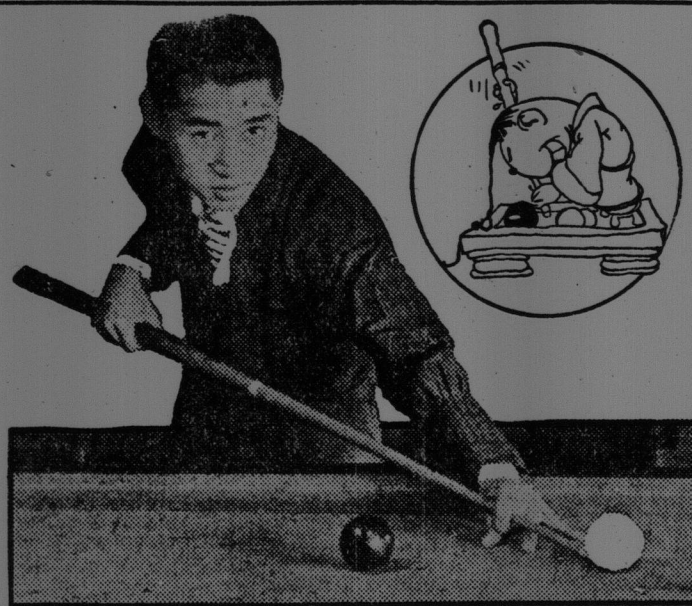

MAY DISCARD PLAN TO VISIT EUROPE

Wants Better Offers for the
Champion's Services.

New York, Dec. 15.—Unless better inducements for the champion's services are offered before the first of the year it is likely that Jack Dempsey, holder of the world's heavyweight title, will discard his plans for another visit to Europe. This became known when Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, declared he was only mildly interested right now in the offers he has received from abroad for a series of exhibitions in which the champion's services are sought. Kearns declared that he had no intention of arranging another ocean trip for Dempsey unless the European offers were made more attractive.

Dempsey is due here today from St. Louis. The titleholder's manager again asserted that he intended to arrange three bouts for Dempsey, if it could be done, for next Summer. If opponents are selected for the champion, Dempsey will be seen in action on Decoration Day, Independence Day and Labor Day.

AMATEUR RULES ARE LESS SEVERE

May be Professional in One
Sport and Amateur in
Another.

Oklahoma City, Okla., Dec. 15.—Oklahoma athletes can fatten the family coffers on the pro gridiron and yet bring amateur glory to their college on the basketball floor under a new ruling made by the Oklahoma intercollegiate conference in annual session recently.

The amended rule says that college athletes in Oklahoma who are found guilty of professionalism in the future will be classed as ineligible only in the sports in which they participated as professionals.

Previous rules had barred professionals from all forms of amateur sports.

Major Leagues To Open April 15

Chicago, Dec. 14.—One of the final acts of the baseball magnates, who have spent the week here in business meetings and player trades, was the agreement of the major league representatives on the opening date of April 15. Last year the leagues opened on different dates.

President Barney Dreyfus, of the Pittsburgh Nationals, said that the opening date was virtually the only thing agreed upon, but that the task of the scheduled committees of each league next February were considerably smoothed by this arrangement.
