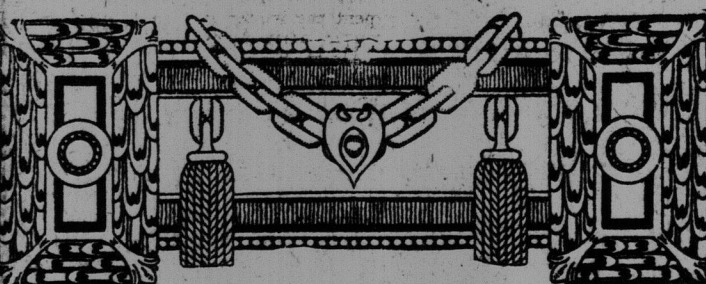

SUDDEN DEATH OF SAMUEL LANDRY

Pioneer and Expert Motion Picture Operator in West St. John But a Few Hours.

Samuel Landry, one of the pioneer operators in the motion picture show game in the Maritime Provinces, and considered one of the most expert workmen in that occupation, died suddenly at his home in Water street, West St. John this morning. Mr. Landry completed his day's work at the Empress Theatre, West St. John last evening about 10:30 o'clock and appeared then to be in the best of health. He went to his home and this morning about 6 o'clock he was found ill and his death followed about four hours later. He is survived by his wife, who will have the sympathy of many in her sudden and acute bereavement. Mr. Landry was about 38 years of age and was a native of New Brunswick. In 1908, when the motion picture was just beginning to gain prominence, he took up the work of operating and since that time he had progressed with the industry until, at the time of his death, he was considered an expert. A. C. Smith, manager of the Empress, said this morning that it would be almost impossible to replace him. His body will be taken to Portland this evening.

Employment Offices in N. B. May Be Closed

Unless some action is taken to prevent it, it is anticipated that the local office of the Employment Service of Canada will be closed on June 30, as well as the two other offices in New Brunswick, located in Moncton and Chatham. According to a letter addressed to Hon. P. J. Veniot, copies of which have been sent to the Mayors of the three places interested, action is being taken by the Federal Department of Labor on account of the fact that the organization has not received the full approval of the Government of New Brunswick. It is understood, however, that provision was made in the provincial budget for the financing of the province's share of the expenses of the three offices for this year. The following dispatch in connection with the matter was received this morning from Moncton: Moncton, N. B., May 30.—At a meeting of the city council here a letter was received from Hon. P. J. Veniot, premier, announcing that he could not encourage the maintenance of the Employment Bureau in Moncton owing to present financial conditions. James Murdoch, Minister of Labor, Ottawa, also wrote that he was of the opinion that after June 30 the Veniot Bureau, as well as those at St. John and Chatham, would be closed. He did not think that owing to present financial conditions Federal aid would be forthcoming to continue these bureaus in operation.

N. S. FISHERIES ASSOCIATION

Officers Chosen at Yarmouth Meeting—A Drive for Membership.

(Special to The Times.) Yarmouth, N. S., May 30.—The adjourned meeting of the Nova Scotia Fisheries Association was held last evening. Among those present were: E. J. Murphy of Liverpool cold storage; J. W. Swin, W. H. Hogge and Mayor Ball of Yarmouth; Mr. Dennis of Boston; Treasurer Lawson, S. C. Baker, G. R. Earl, A. E. Nickerson, Capt. Wm. Murphy, A. W. Baldus of Yarmouth; Wm. Powell of Stony Island, and James H. Conlon of Montreal, secretary of the Canadian Fisheries Association. Mr. Hogge was chairman.

The following were elected: President, A. W. Eakin; vice-presidents, Fraser Grey, Lunenburg; E. J. Murphy, Queens County; W. A. Hogge, Shelburne; A. E. Nickerson, Yarmouth; D. B. Whittman, Westport; H. B. Short, Digby; directors, Harry Adams, Lunenburg; Jerry Nickerson, Queens; Wm. Powell, Shelburne; G. R. Earl, Yarmouth; Capt. Longmire, Annapolis; D. B. Kenner, Digby. Fifty dollar contributions were received from A. E. Nickerson, Ltd., and the Lockport Cold Storage Co.

Any person who is actively engaged directly or indirectly in the commercial or scientific development, conservation or protection of the fishing industry is eligible for membership. The general expression of the meeting was that this fisheries association can accomplish material betterment for all those engaged in the fishing industry in western Nova Scotia. An active drive will be made to enlarge this organization by canvassing for membership all those engaged in deep sea fishing, curing and marketing.

PASTEURIZED MILK.

(Statement by Board of Health.) Reports have come to the Board of Health office that the pasteurized milk delivered in the city has no cream in it, and that the milk is thin and watery.

We wish to advise all consumers that a thorough system of inspection is made daily at all milk plants, and we find that all milk distributed from them is well above the standard for butter-fat. A close watch is kept upon the individual shipper of milk, and frequent tests made so that adulterated or low-testing milk can be eliminated. The legal fat standard for the city is 3.25 per cent, and the milk sold from the several plants shows from 3.80 to 4.0 per cent.

We also wish to advise that when once the milk enters the plants there is no possibility of any cream being removed, as the process through which it passes absolutely precludes the change.

In our next article we will describe the care and attention given the milk supply by the officials of the Board of Health, and also the process through which the milk passes, practically speaking, from the producer to the consumer.

MISS CANADA HOME TOOK NICE SALMON

Miss Blair and Party Arrive After Delightful Outing at Cain's River.

Fredericton, N. B., May 30.—Having enjoyed to the utmost the thrills of landing a fifteen pound New Brunswick salmon when she made the party's first catch on her ten day fishing trip on Cain's River, Miss Canada left here yesterday for St. John this morning to rest for a few days at her home before leaving for Cape Breton where she will attend a King's birthday celebration.

Miss Canada, accompanied by her mother, Mrs. F. R. Blair, of St. John, and her sponsor and chaperone, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Gooding, returned last evening by C. N. R. from Cain's River, accompanied by a moving picture camera man who had been with the party.

W. Harry Allen, president of the N. B. Guides Association, had a large party of guides, assistants and cooks for Miss Canada and her party and it was a fishing trip de luxe. They lived in comfortable and spacious camps and kept in touch with the outside world by radio, enjoying concerts each night. All the salmon caught ranged from nine to seventeen pounds.

Before leaving for St. John Miss Canada said she had accepted an invitation to visit Miss America at Cleveland, Ohio, the latter part of June.

Miss Canada and party arrived early this afternoon on the Boston train. They said they had a wonderful trip. They explained that they had paddled along Cain's river through to Blackville, a distance of seventy miles and camped each night enroute. They saw a large number of moose, deer and other wild game. Pictures of Miss Canada catching the first salmon with a fly named, "Miss Canada" and numerous other scenes were shot by W. G. McLaughlin of Halifax.

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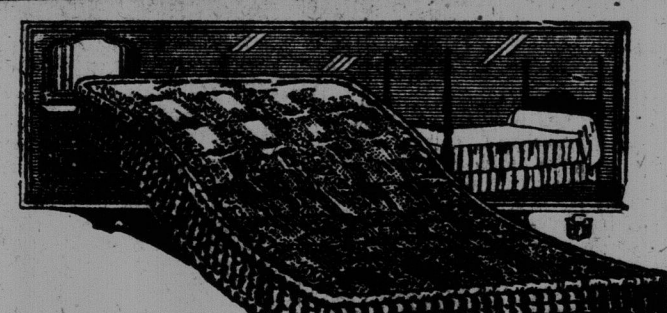
