RING.

The Bantamweights.

New York, Nov. 8.—The bantamweight boxing title, which is to be defended by Johnny Buff of Jersey City against Jack Sharkey of New York in a fifteen-round bout on Thursday night, has changed hands three times in the last year. Joe Lynch of New York received the judge's decision over Pete Herman of New Orleans here last December, but Herman, after a series of victories abroad, returned and outpointed Lynch, regaining the title, which he soon lost to Buff in another contest. Besides Sharkey, prominent aspirants for the crown are Carl Tremaine, Cleveland; Joe Burman, Chicago; Charles Ledoux, France; Phil O'Dowd, Columbus, and Lynch and Herman.

Off Track for Life.

Cleveland, Nov. 8.—Ogden Girt, a mare which has been raced with more or less success on U. S. and Canadian running tracks, was ruled off for life by Fred Gerhardt, presiding judge at the Maple Heights track near here yesterday. W. Anderson, who, it is alleged, entered Ogden Girt under the name of Claremeier, in a race at Maple Heights on Oct. 29, and W. Johnson, Ogden Girt's trainer, received similar penalties.

Sports Well Contested.

The programme of sports held under the auspices of the St. John Garrison Sports and Entertainment Association in the armory last night were a grand success from every standpoint. The offer came from the University of Sydney, which wants to meet the best U. S. runners in a distance relay race on Pennsylvania's famous track. Pennsylvania is under a promise to race in England next spring if Oxford and Cambridge succeed in getting up a meet along the lines of Pennsylvania's relay carnival, which has grown to be one of the world's great college athletic meetings.
